From pie baking to watermelon smashing, from early morning breakfasts to evening fireworks, from races and tournaments to parades and pool parties, be sure to check out all the area has to offer.

Stanfield

Why wait for the Fourth? Stanfield kicks off its celebration Friday evening with an annual steak feed from



A beer garden with music will be open there from 6 p.m. to midnight, and a light show will take place at dusk.

On the morning of the Fourth, the festivities begin with the Firemen's Breakfast at 7 a.m. at the Stanfield Community Center. Registration for a fun run and park vendors begins at 7 a.m. in Bard Park, and parade registration begins at 8 a.m. in front of Crossroads Community Church on N. Sherman Street. People can sign up for the three-on-three basketball tournament between 8:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. at the park.

The fun run starts at 8 a.m., followed by the basket-ball tournament at 9 a.m. At 10 a.m., the parade weaves its way through town, and a variety of activities begin in Bard Park at 11 a.m. The celebration will feature vendors, children's games, a water slide, entertainment and more.

If you think you can make the best pie around, bring it to the park by 11 a.m. for the pie baking contest. If a rubber duck race is more your style, that begins at noon.

New this year, the Wyked A & I Car Club is hosting a car show with registration from 11 a.m. until the show, which runs from noon to 4 p.m.

Although most of the park activities end at 3 p.m., a fireworks and light show will take place at dusk.
