Knights shut out Enterprise at Kennison

Irrigon junior racks up 230 yards on six touches

Carlos Zacharias touched the football six times Friday night.

Ordinarily, that wouldn't be noteworthy. But the Irrigon junior running back turned those six touches into 230 yards and three touchdowns as the Irrigon Knights rolled the Enterprise Outlaws 53-0 Friday night in Hermiston at Kennison Field.

"I didn't even expect it," Zacharias said of his big night. "I just do my job and get it done no matter what."

Zacharias took the opening hand-off from senior quarterback Nathan Verley from the Irrigon 32 yard-line, and came around the edge untouched until he stopped 68 yards later and Irrigon led 6-0.

It was the first of four scoring drives that included two plays or fewer. A drive later, after Verley found Marty Brown for a short touchdown pass, Zacharias took another hand-off, made two moves, and was gone for a 71-yard score that put Irrigon firmly in control.

It was just an indication of things to come for an Irrigon (2-0) offense that also boasts senior running back Freddy Vera, who wasn't going to let Zacharias take all the glory.

The senior rushed for 116 yards on just six carries with a touchdown, and also caught a pass for a 35-yard touchdown. He also took a handoff 81 yards to the endzone in the first quarter to put Irrigon up 28-0.

Despite the offensive performance — 537 yards of total offense — first-year head coach Steve Sheller isn't ready to declare the season a success just yet.

"What's most important is just that we keep moving forward," he said. "It's kind of a new program, and there's new ideas and new thoughts

really what we're about is keeping moving forward... Complacency is our enemy right now."

Sheller said that the focus of this week's preparations was to win the battle at the line of scrimmage, and they did that with a statement Friday night. He said the coaching staff challenged an offensive line that wasn't quite playing up to its potential.

Verley said the guys up front more than responded.

"I think the linemen did really well tonight," he said. "Even though they did really well, (they) still can get better. We all can get better." Irrigon's offense will get all of the praise, but the Knight's defense was just as good. They unit didn't allow a first down until Enterprise's fourth drive following three three-and-outs and only allowed one big play — a 43yard run by Outlaws quarterback Justin Exon.

On that drive, Irrigon held Enterprise (0-2) without score after coming up with a goal line stand that was finally ended by the halftime buzzer. Enterprise got close again in the third quarter, with the clock running and the result firmly in hand, yet the Outlaws couldn't score. A false start penalty and stifling run defense gave the Knights the ball with about eight minutes left.

sending the players into a frenzy in the east end zone. Freshman backup quarterback Zach Hendrichs rolled right and found Lino Covarrubia, also a freshman, who broke a tackle and dove for the pylon as the buzzer sounded. Covarrubia was mobbed by his teammates as the buzzer sound. In two games, the Knights have outscored their opponents 100-8.

Irrigon travels up the river to visit Umatilla (2-0) next week at 7 p.m. Enterprise again comes south for a meeting with Heppner (2-0) at 7 p.m.

Umatilla wins again

STANFIELD 55, TRI-CITIES PREP 17 — At Pasco, Wash., in a game of contrasting styles, the Tigers ran roughshod over the Jaguars on Friday for a non-league win.

Thyler Monkus ran for 204 yards on 12 carries and scored twice, and quarterback Dylan Grogan ran for 117 yards on 13 carries and four touchdowns. Grogan also passed for 147 yards, finding Monkus for two catches and 64 yards.

Justin Keeney added 99 combined yards on offense and one rushing touchdown for Stanfield (2-0), and Makiah Blankenship also scored on a run.

"(Tri-Cities Prep) came out and threw the ball a lot so we had to eat some clock," said first-year Stanfield coach Davy Salas. "We just kept it on the ground and kept pounding it. They had some size up front so we had to really work for our yards today."

Stanfield led 27-10 at halftime, and Salas said the Jaguars' fast pace started to wear on his thin roster late in the game but players gutted through cramps.

"We kind of had to adjust on the fly because weren't really expecting an aerial assault like that," Salas said. "Our defensive backs did a great job and we kind of took the approach of bend don't break."

Stanfield plays its home opener next Friday when it hosts Grant Union at 7 p.m.

IONE 44, ECHO 12 — At Ione, the Cardinals showed each weapon in the offensive arsenal, downing the Cougars on the road.

Leading 20-12 at halftime, Ione (1-1) piled it on in the second half with four more touchdowns.

"It was real good progress," said Cardinals coach Stan Weiper. "We had a better defense, too, which helped."

Echo (1-1) got the scoring going first to start the game, as Cougars quarterback Klay Jensen tossed a 95-yard touchdown pass, and then followed it up with a 55-yard touchdown run. However, Jensen later left the game with a hip injury and did not return.

Cord Flynn was the player of the game for the Cardinals. He scored three touchdowns in three different ways. First it was a 50-yard touchdown run, followed by an 80-yard touchdown catch and ended with a 30-yard touchdown pass.
