District seeks contract for in-school health center

Hermiston students and school staff may have easier access to medical services next year.

The Hermiston School Board authorized district administrators to finalize contract agreements for a school wellness center at the meeting Monday.

Superintendent Fred Maiocco said the center at Hermiston High School will be staffed by a contracted medical group that will receive payment for the services from the patients, so the district will not have to pay for the medical services. He said the medical group will assume most of the business risk, but beginning next school year, if the wellness center operates at a loss of more than \$10,000 per quarter, the district will be liable for up to \$7,000 per quarter.

Maiocco said representatives from two groups, Family Health Associates and Providence Medical, toured the facility, but Family Health Associates submitted the only bid to provide services. He said the wellness center is scheduled to open Jan. 1 but will only operate halftime until the demand for services necessitates fulltime staffing.

The center will provide students, staff and their dependents certain services, such as well visits, physicals, screenings, diagnosing and treating acute illnesses, vaccinations and referrals for more advanced care, Maiocco said. Services relating to contraceptives, sexually transmitted diseases and mental health will not be provided on school district property,

Executive Director of Special Programs Jon Mishra said the district first had discussions about creating a wellness center in 2013. He said the district was methodical in developing the program and involved all of the stakeholders in the process.

"We're going to be able to provide a service to our children," he said, adding staff members would also benefit from reduced waiting times for simple ailments.

Board member Don Rankin, however, said the district would only further undermine parental authority by establishing the wellness center. He said the schools now feed many students and take care of them during the

"It seems like it keeps snowballing," he said.

Rankin requested the item be removed from the consent agenda to be voted on separately.

Board member Maria Duron said parents would still be responsible for the students because they would have to pay for, or have insurance to cover, the cost of the medical services

"I see this as a great benefit, not another thing we are taking on," she said.

Rankin voted against authorizing the district to finalize the contracts, but the action item passed,

A former pastor turned social media personality originally announced on Facebook (Nov. 5 at 10:56 a.m.) that Starbucks had lost his business and encouraged others to also boycott

the coffee empire. Joshua Feuerstein's post also includes a link to a piece — "Starbucks 'Holiday cups' No Longer Contain **Tammy** Christmas Refer-Malgesini ences" written by Michael Cantrell on SHOES

theradicals.com that explains his sudden disdain for Starbucks.

However, it seems Feuerstein's personal blackballing of Starbucks lasted a little more than an hour. In his follow-up post at 12:15 p.m., Feuerstein encourages people to join him in a movement he's calling #merrychristmasstarbucks.

"Starbucks REMOVED CHRISTMAS from their cups because they hate Jesus ... SO I PRANKED THEM," the post says, which includes a video clip shot in front of a Starbucks with Feuerstein clutching a holiday cup.

Feuerstein's accusation against the coffee kingdom was in response to the company opting to go with "plain red" cups this holiday season. By the way, the cup is red and includes the green Starbucks logo, which, to me, displays the classic colors generally associated with Christmas.

According to the company website, the first Starbucks holiday cup introduced in 1997 featured "... a jazz-themed design in jewel tones of deeper reds, greens and blues."

To me, this doesn't exactly scream Christmas other than the fact it included red and green.

The company website goes on to say, "Every year since, the cup has told a story of the holidays by featuring symbols of the season from vintage ornaments and hand-drawn reindeer to modern vector-illustrated

characters." Starbucks notes people have been doodling images

on their cups for years. This

year's "plain" holiday cup provides a "blank canvas" to further encourage the creativity of its customers, the website states. Starbucks has even held red cup contests with the winners receiving gift cards.

Although three of my Facebook friends "like" Joshua Feuerstein's Facebook page, I had never heard of him until this whole Starbucks thing went viral.
