Her family moved to the Snake River Valley and then, to Wilder, Idaho, before moving to Oregon where Eunice graduated from Drain High School in 1933. Eunice married her husband Vernis (Mike) in 1934.

The Powells soon started their family and had two children. Robert and Bonita. During that time, Eunice lived what she called a "Loggers Life." She worked with her husband's logging company until 1949.

Mike and Eunice bought a farm near Homedale, Idaho, which became their home for 25 years. During that time, and 15 years after Bonita was born, they were blessed with Marilyn.

Eunice stayed very busy being a homemaker and a mother of three children. When Mike retired in 1975 they moved to




