Neal won the starting job to open last year, but played just five games before an ankle injury ended his season with a 73.6 QB rating and 36-of-74 passing for 410 yards, three touchdowns and one interception. He also carried the ball 85 times for 421 yards and four touchdowns.

Pendleton will replace graduated two-year starter Kai Quinn with junior Nick Bower, who was named top junior quarterback at the Western Oregon camp.

"Ever since I've been a kid it's always been a goal to potentially be that guy, so now that it's here it's kind of like a dream come true," Bower said. "I'm confident coming in, so we'll see."

Davis believes he's ready.

"He was our JV quarterback last year. We couldn't protect him and so he was kind of running for his life," Davis said. "So in order for him to really get the experience he needs to be a great varsity quarterback he was going to have to do a lot in the offseason too. And he did

"Everybody's looking forward and being positive

about their approach," Faaeteete said. "Half the battle is attitude and showing up.

Hermiston has five home dates on the schedule this season but one stands out right away — the Sept. 23 game that features the last two state champions when Summit and their 5A Player of the Year quarterback, senior John Bledsoe, come to Kennison Field on Oct. 28.

"Our hope is that they're healthy and undefeated and we'll go from there," Faaeteete said. "That will be a fun night under the lights."

Hermiston also hosts league foes Mountain View (Sept. 16), Ridgeview (Oct. 7) and rival Pendleton (Oct. 28) in their regular-season finale. Hermiston has won the last four straight against the Bucks.

"Those things are exciting," Salinas said. "We're going to get to test ourselves against some better opponents in Oregon, and hopefully make it to the playoffs in this tough conference and just show everybody what we're made of."

be back ... this is my 10th year here and I'll probably always come back as long as I'm rodeoing," he said.

Thursday

Oregon steer wrestler Trevor Knowles has made the Wrangler National Finals every year since 2004, and entered the Farm-City Pro Rodeo — which his uncle helped found 28 years ago — feeling the pressure of keeping that streak going.

"It's been a rough year for me," said the Mount Vernon cowboy of a season that has him at No. 21 in the world standings. "Long story short, my dad's health wasn't real good this spring. I came home for quite a while, and then he started doing a little better and I decided I could go compete again. So I've been trying to make a comeback here since June."

After an initial hot streak that saw him win the aggregate in Sisters and place second in Reno, Nevada, things have cooled considerably, and Knowles needs to make up about \$5,000 to get into the running for the world finals.

"It always turns, and I'm getting impatient," he said. "You know, it's August and I'd like to have some opportunities to fill my pockets in the next 60 days."

Friday

There will be no buyer's remorse for Mike McGinn regarding his latest purchase.

The single-horse pow-

ered "Chevy" may be just the pickup his season needs, and the Oregon steer wrestler got some immediate returns on his investment with a 4.1-second time in Friday's performance.

"I just bought this horse Thursday so this is my first rodeo on him," said the cowboy from nearby Haines. "It worked out pretty cool."

McGinn said he didn't but Chevy without a test drive, and the two paired to win in Greeley, Colorado, earlier this summer, but this was his first time riding him as owner.

He won't have a chance to win in Hermiston after missing his first draw, but his 4.1 is the quickest time of the week.

"It's pretty cool because, heck, this is home," said the first-time Farm-City contestant. "I live like an hour from here and it's awesome. Hermiston's got a great crowd and it's fun, every-

body knows you. McGinn is 24th on the Columbia River Circuit, and said he hopes his check from Hermiston is enough to get him into the hunt for the circuit finals.

Rhen Richard of Roosevelt, Utah, had the quickest tie-down time with an 8.5 that he paired with an 8.9 in slack to move into second place in the aggregate with 17.4.

The 2014 Farm-City all-around champion was right on the NFR bubble at No. 15 in the world entering the week.

"I've had a crappy last couple weeks so I need to get back on the winning ways for sure," he said. "I drew pretty good here ... so I'm hoping to get a little money in each round
