Morrow Co. fair kicks off Aug. 16–20

The fair kicks off Wednesday, Aug. 16, at 74473 Highway 74, Heppner. In addition to the daily 4-H and FFA contests, there is a Kids Fun Zone and The Reptile Man. Fair admission is \$4 for ages 8 and up (\$10 for a pass) and free for those 7 and under.
