She was an active member of ASB, the school newspaper, and selected to go to Girl's State. Her yearbooks are filled with evidence of her enjoyment of these memorable years. She was also involved with Rainbow Girls, achieving the chair of Worthy Advisor. Somehow she even managed to work part-time at Diamond's Five

In 1949 she married Don Loomis. This union blessed her with four children. During this time she worked as a telephone opera-
