wire and staple to post some distance ahead, leaving the staples loose
enough so the wire will silp when it is drawn tight. Let elght or ten feet of
wire extend beyond the post and to

wire tight. Put a plcket between the
wires and turn the blocks over as often as you wish to twist the wire between
each picket; then put in another picket each picket; then put in another picket
and twist the other way, etc. To preserve posts, mix pulverized charconl in paint and apply with a brush.

thick for three feet around the tree.
