A severe earthquake shock was felt in San Francisco yesterday. The water mains were broken and fire broke out in several places. Reports last night state that 950 people are known to be dead and the fire was still rag-

ing. Among the buildings wrecked and destroyed are the Cliff House, Examiner and Chronicle offices, Stanford University. As we go to press reports state that the fire is gaining headway. The estimated loss is 3000 lives.
