**LOCAL NEWS**

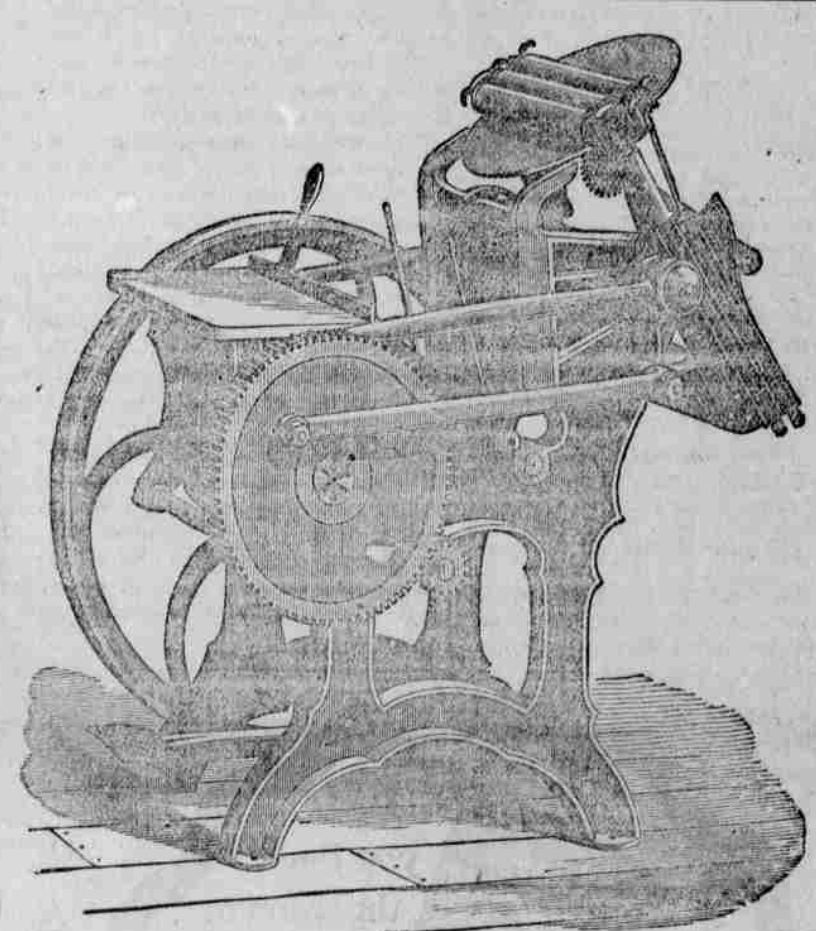
Everybody busy harvesting.

In past years Lexington merchants have been keeping their places of business open on Sundays. This year they have decided to keep the stores closed on Sunday and as a consequence harvest supplies are being purchased through the week and the merchant is given a chance to rest and become acquainted with his family.  
 On last Saturday afternoon at the close of banking hours, E. D. Brown, of the Lexington Bank, locked the inner door of the safe and on attempting to open the safe Monday morning, found that the combination would not work and as a consequence the door is yet locked. An expert will be sent for to open the lock and an entire new lock placed on the door. This is the first time the door has been locked for several months as it had given trouble before.  
 At the Council meeting last Monday evening, present Mayor, W. E. Leach, Councilmen, E. D. McMillan, W. P. McMillan and R. L. Bengé, Recorder John B. White. An ordinance to amend ordinance No. 1, restraining animals running at large on the streets approved and passed. The Treasurer was instructed to pay the Evans note against the city. Bill of Electric Co. was explained and a warrant for \$49.20 in payment of lights to February 1, 1907, ordered issued. Bill of W. G. Scott for \$24 for water rent for the month of June, was ordered paid. On motion Council adjourned.
