### FIRST STATUE TO ALEXANDRA.

The first public statue of Queen Alexandra has just been commissioned. George E. Wade, the well known sculptor, has been chosen to do the work. The destination of the statue is Hongkong, which has already given commissions for statues of King Edward and the Prince of Wales. The new statue is being erected out of a fund raised in connection with the Hongkong coronation celebration. The queen will be represented in her coronation robes. The statue will be of bronze and life size, and the pedestal will be either of granite or marble. The king, to whom the proposal was submitted through the governor of Hongkong, readily gave Unless we take God for a beginning his permission.
