The following is a copy of Senat Resolution of March 19. 1906: Resolved, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, directed to furnish to the Serate, on the first Monday in December, 1906, the names of the persons, firms and cor porations who conveyed or relinquished to the Government of the United States lands within the limits of Goverrment forest reserves, and who duly recorded the same in the proper county prior to the Act of March 2 , 1905 , and who prior to said Act failed to so lect other public lands in lieu of the lands so conveyed or relinquished, or who have failed, through no fault of their own, to obtain patents to lands seiected by them in lieu of lands so conveyed or relinquished, as provided by the Act of June 4, 1897, and who can not on accaunt of said Act of March 3, 1905, make such selection, and also report the number of acres so conveyed or relinquished.
That in order to procure such information the Secretary of the Interior is hereby authorized and directed to require all such persons, firms, and parturnent, within a time to be by De designated, such proofs of their conveyance or relitnuishment as he may prescribe; and he is further wotheria and directed to make such turne and drected to make such further or ders, rules, and regulations as may be neccessary to ppocure the information
hereby required.
Pursuant to the above resolution all persons, firms, and corporations are directed to file in the office of the General Land office on or before OC-
tober I, 1906, an instrument in writtober 1,1906 , an instrument
ing describing the land rellinquished to the Gevernment prior to March 1905.
