## THE DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE

Holds an interesting and enthusiastic meeting. Local organization formed.

The Development League meeting last Friday afternoon was well attended by the farmers of this vicinity. The meeting was called to order and an address of welcome was delivered by J. M. White, after which short talks were given by Attorneys Woodson and Nelson, of Heppner, on the value and benefits of co operation and organization. Judge Ayers was the next to respond and gave one of his good talks that always make the Judge popular. G. B. Alley spoke for a few moments on the creamery and the advantages of dairying and diversified farming. Sheriff Shuff was then called to the floor and made one of those characteristic talks that always seem to bring him new friends and bring his old ones

closer to him. Geo. Conser was next called on but owing to some misunderstanding was not prepared for an address, yet the people of Lexington had been given to understand that Mr. Conser had prepared an eloquent address. H. C. Willis, the "Pandemonium Booster", next took the floor and explained the grain sack question and assisted in starting a local organization. The Inland Wheat Growers Association, which Mr. Willis represented, guarantees to furnish sacks to its members at wholesale prices with the freight added and further guarantees the price not to exceed 9 1/2 cents. In order to become a member of this association you must purchase 5 shares of capital stock at \$1. per share. For \$5. you can save from one half to two

cents each on your sack bill for this years crop and will be allowed to pool your wheat with the association wheat. There is a strong probability that a number of our farmers will take advantage of this offer and place orders for several thousand sacks.

Mr. Willis expressed himself as well pleased with the meeting and that he found Lexington a much better town than he expected.

The local organization of the Development League elected the following officers: President W. E. Leach; V. P., W. B. McAllister; Secretary, S. A. Thomas; Treasurer, H. L. Beuge; Directors, H. E. Briffault, B. P. Sengert, J. M. White, W. R. Campbell, W. G. Scott and A. W. Bauer.

It is expected that a meeting of the directors will be held next Saturday when by laws and constitution will be adopted.

## THE LEXINGTON CREAMERY

Commenced Operations Last Monday With a Good Patronage. E. D. Brown buys the First Pound.

E. D. Brown has the honor of purchasing the first pound of butter turned out by the Lexington Creamery. On Monday last the creamery commenced operations and received 307 pounds of whole milk and 101 pounds of separated cream. On Wednesday morning 42 pounds of butter was churned and the first print made was sold at auction to E. D. Brown for \$2.50. The balance of this first churning will be sold to the local trade at 50 cents per pound. S. E. Nelson taking one pound to his home in Heppner, stating that in the future he would insist on having Lexington Butter.
