Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Graham went to the Swede Canyon Poultry farm yesterday where they will make their home for the next year.

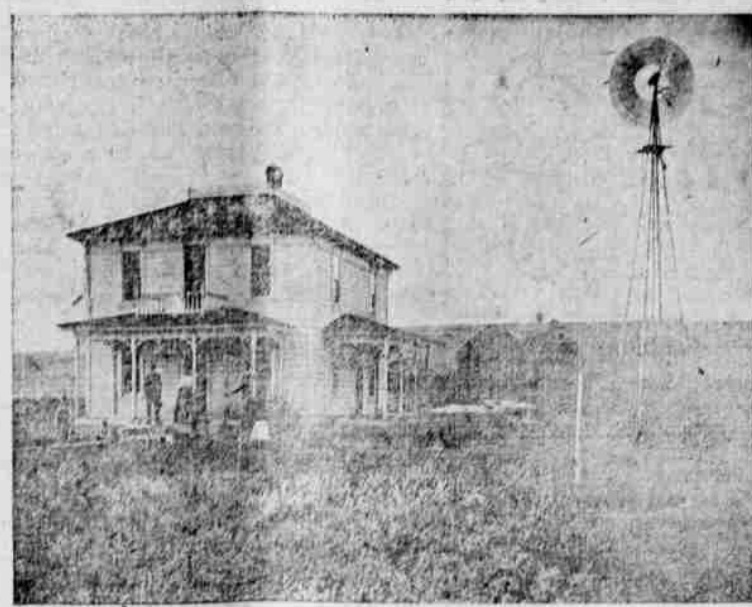
