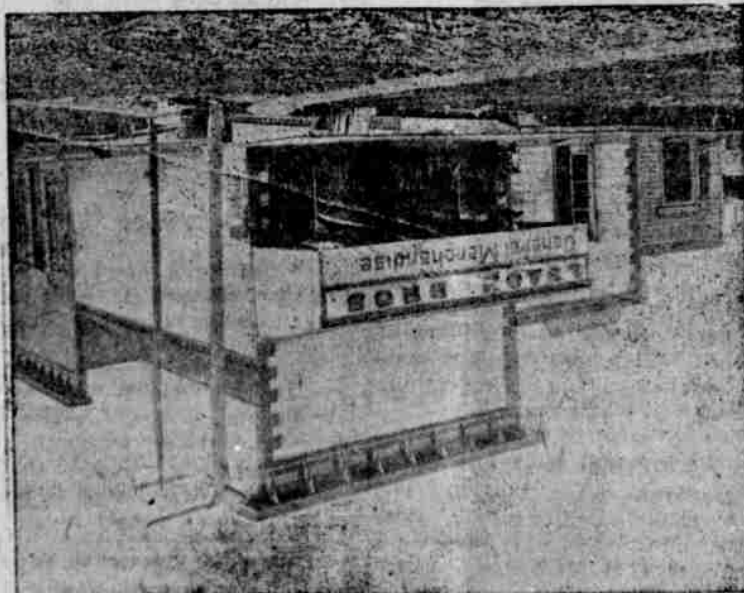
All pupils expecting to take Ninth and Tenth grade work will please leave their order at the Drug store if they wish books as but a limited number has been ordered for those grades.
