To the People of Mosier and all Whom it May Concern:- GREETING!

OUR POLICY.

Improvements in Town

A number of improvements are under way and projected in Mosier, and when they are all completed, the town will present a different appearance.

E. N. Stroup is erecting a substantial frame building 40x70 feet, the lower floor of which will be used as a general merchandise store, the upper story as a lodge room and dance hall. This is at present the largest and most imposing structure in town and is evidence of Mr. Stroup's business sagacity and progressiveness.

Fruit Prospects for Mosier.

While it cannot be denied that the exceptionally cold snap last January injured fruit in this, as well as all other districts in Eastern Oregon, the extent of the damage here is not so great as has been reported in Portland papers, and it is only reasonable to suppose that the person who gave out the report that most of the fruit and some of the trees had been killed, did so without first thoroughly informing himself on the subject.

J. P. Carroll, Fruit Inspector for Wasco County, recently made the following statement to the writer—unofficial because he had not completed his investigations in the entire county. Mr. Carroll says:

"I have made a partial examination of the fruit conditions in Mosier district and find that while the peach and apricot crop will be a failure this year, and the pear crop will no doubt be light, there will be practically a full crop of apples, cherries and small fruits, providing the weather conditions are favorable from now on. Of course the critical period for cherries has not yet passed, but the circulated report that great damage has been done to most of the fruit is erroneous, misleading and injurious to this section, and should be corrected."

While it is known locally up and down the Columbia basin that no finer fruit grows anywhere than that produced in Mosier district, the fame of this particular locality as a producer of fruit of the finest quality has not reached the outside world and eastern buyers suppose they are getting apples from sections of Oregon that have been widely advertised. But Mosier apples will come into their own soon, as Mosier fruit growers are staming their boxes with their name and residence, and "Mosier Apples" or "Grown in Mosier" stamped on a box of apples or other fruit will be sufficient to command the top prices in any market.


