At present his field contains 27 acres of Clarke Seedling, which is considered the best commercial variety on the market. These berries are grown on side hills where natural irrigation is impossible, but Mr. Bateham has, at considerable expense, installed a very complete gravity system of artificial sprinkling, which answers the purpose admirably, and the result is most satisfactory. He also has fine orchards of various tree fruits, and his is one of the most valuable farms in the country.

A gentleman was in town the first of the week looking up a location for a drug store. He says Mosier looks good to him.

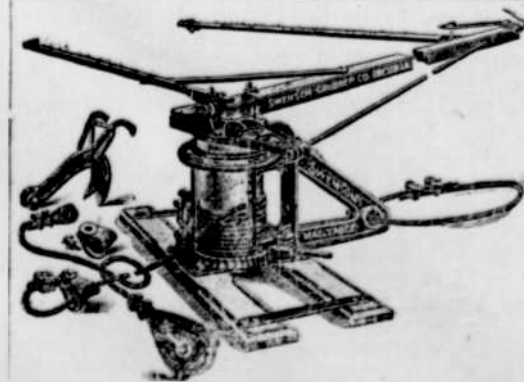
