A recent issue of the Bulletin contained a loud call for the organization of a commercial club, or something of the kind that could "connect up with Portland." This would be surprising to the 30-odd members here and half as many more in Portland who have been members of the Commercial Club of Mosier Valley for a year and a half, were it not known that you are still a stranger to the valley.

The existing organization is on the roster of the Oregon Development League and has been replying to all communications received and sending away large quantities of advertising matter at a cost of several hundred dollars, besides furthering local improvements at a larger cost.

The banquet given by the Club over a year ago to newspaper men and other prominent citizens of Oregon was a notable event and gave great impetus to the development of the valley.

The secretary of the Club, Dr. D. Robinson, has faithfully attended to the correspondence and other duties of the office, and while he was away from home Mr. and Mrs. Akers kept up the work.

The reasons you advance for the existence of such a club are forcefully put. United and harmonious work is what is needed. If all the residents of Mosier Valley were really to try, there is nothing within reason that they could not accomplish. The population of the valley might be trebled in two years if all contributed their share of effort and means. I heartily endorse your spirit and hope it will revive an active interest in the Commercial Club and make Boosters of everyone in Mosier.

**OUR POLICY**

### Some Interesting Figures

The following statement of receipts at Mosier depot for the years 1907 and 1908, shows that business is increasing, and is a strong argument in favor of the Harriman systems recognizing the importance (to the system as well as to the town) of giving us everything in reason we ask for:

Passenger receipts:  
For 1907 - \$4,097.52  
" 1908 - 3,140.16

Freight receipts:  
For 1907 - \$3,646.49  
" 1908 - 5,095.42

Increase in freight receipts in 1908 over 1907 \$1,448.93; Decrease in passenger receipts in 1908 of \$957.35 was due to the fact that there was no night operation during the year 1908, and passengers were forced to pay fare on the train. Figures are not obtainable for the receipts in fares paid on the train, but it is safe to say that the ratio of passenger and freight traffic would be about equal. The increase in the freight business for March, this year over February, this year, is \$297.51, which is a most satisfactory gain. The general increase of business is sufficient to justify the O. R. & N. Co. in increasing the warehouse facilities, giving us a good waiting room and making Mosier a regular stopping point for train No. 1.
