Wool Sells at 20 Cents
PENDLETON, OR., April 17.—In
contracting to sell 180,000 pounds
of this year's wool clip at 20 cents
a pound, Montie B. Gwynn, of
this city, president of the Mal-
heur Livestock Association, says
the Oregonian, has probably
made the largest and best wool
sale of the season in Oregon.
The news of the sale has caused
general rejoicing among local
growers, as it is taken as an in-
dication of what they can expect.
It is also reported here that sev-
eral hundred pounds of Montana
wool have been contracted for at
22 cents.
