RECEIVES APPOINTMENT

Harold Dabney, son of O. P. Dabney this week received the news of his appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point. The appointment, which has been accepted, was made through Congressman W. R. Ellis of the second congressional district and is to take effect in March, 1910, at which time Dabney will enter the institution, if he passes the preliminary tests. The regular course of work will be taken up in the following September. Examinations will be held on January 10, 1910, at San Francisco and young Dabney is now making preparations for them.

Dabney was born at Livingston, Mont., in 1890 and at the age of 12 came to Portland with his parents. Here he entered the Shattuck Grammar school graduating in 1907. He later entered the Lincoln high school where he is at present a junior. Dabney has been prominent in social and athletic affairs at the high school and has made many friends. He played right end on the football team for three years and was picked as an all-star end in 1907. He was also a guard on the basket ball team during the past two seasons, and is now manager of the base ball team. --Hood River News.
