

THINGS JAPANESE.

What Is Being Done in the Way of Promoting Industry and Trade. Japan's budget for 1909 provides

total taxation of 320,535,132 yen. The principal items are, in yen: Land tax 85,488,397; sake tax, 81,528,918; customs duties, 47,229,721; income tax, 29, 729,858; business tax, 23,037,790; tax on textile fabrics consumed, 19,462, 196; tax on sugar consumed, 17,208,916 In addition the profit of the monopoly bureau will be 54,251,958 yen, the New York Sun says.

By subsidies Japan encourages ship navigation, shipbuilding, agriculture, banking, waterworks, harbor works preservation of old shrines and temples, education, road improvements. bridge building, sewage and sanitary works, education of settlers, deep sea fishing, colonization, technology, sugar manufacture, mulberry farming and other lines of effort.

Formosa's civil administration budget for 1909 calls for an expenditure of 82,234,549 yen, with a revenue of 32,275,449 yen.

On Dec. 31, 1908, Japan's outstanding national loans (domestic and foreign) amounted to 2,214,507,272 yen, a decrease during the month of 26,622,-530 yen.

Japan's currency in circulation on Dec. 31, 1908, was 503,399,746 yen, consisting of 150,665,474 in specie and 852,-734,272 in convertible notes. During December 1908, the Tokio

bank clearing house did a business of 303,900,096 yen, an increase of 911,132 yen over December, 1907. Postal banks in Japan had on Dec 31 8,502,050 depositors, with 104,448,

567 yen to their credit. Dividends paid by various Japanese ompanies range from 4 to 36 per cent year. Fifty yen is the almost universal face value of Japanese's corpo ration stocks.

In 1908 Japan's foreign trade totaled 814,498,908 yen, consisting of 378,239,-436 yen exports and 436,259,472 yen imports. The excess of imports over exports was 58,020,036 yen. Raw cotton led in imports and raw silk in exports, being 90,000,000 yen and 108,000,000 yen respectively. The imports included machinery worth 34,000,000 yen and petroleum 15,000,000 yen. Other chief imports were rice, beans, sugar, wool, flax, hemp, oil cake and fron bars and rails

In its mercantile marine Japan has 1,618 steamships, of 1,153,340 aggregate tonnage; 4,515 sailing vessels, of 372, 319 aggregate tonnage, and 1,390 Japanese "ships of the old style," of 511, 452 aggregate tonnage; in all, 7,523 ships, of 2,037,111 aggregate tonnage. Japan is selling coal to China to the value of about 7,000,000 taels (\$5,000,-

000) a year, fully three-fourths of all the coal China imports. The big vessels for use in the Pa cific trade are now building at the Mitsubishi dockyards for the Oriental Steamship Company. One is of 13,500


