WASHINGTON LOSES

Supreme Court Upholds Oregon In Boundary Controversy.

Washington, May 25.—The United States Supreme court yesterday declined to grant a rehearing in the Oregon-Washington boundary case involving the location of the state line near the mouth of the Columbia river.

The court, however, holds that the question involved is so simple, and the facts so apparent, that there is no ground whatever for the contention of Washington, and it therefore declines to give further attention to the controversy.

FLOOD IN OKLAHOMA.

Oklahoma City, Okla., May 25.—Five persons are dead and at least 10 seriously injured, several thousand acres of crops are inundated and every stream in the northern and eastern part of the state raging as a result of an almost unprecedented rain during the last 24 hours in Oklahoma.

WAR AT SEATTLE.

THINGS JAPANESE.

What is Being Done in the Way of Promoting Industry and Trade. Japan's budget for 1909 provides a total taxation of \$29,855,132 yen.

Formosa's civil administration budget for 1909 calls for an expenditure of \$2,254,549 yen, with a revenue of \$2,275,419 yen.

On Dec. 31, 1908, Japan's outstanding national loans (domestic and foreign) amounted to 2,214,507,272 yen, a decrease during the month of 26,622,630 yen.

Dividends paid by various Japanese companies range from 4 to 36 per cent a year. Fifty yen is the almost universal face value of Japanese's corporation stocks.

In 1908 Japan's foreign trade totaled \$14,498,908 yen, consisting of \$78,239,436 yen exports and \$26,259,472 yen imports.

In its mercantile marine Japan has 1,618 steamships, of 1,153,340 aggregate tonnage; 4,515 sailing vessels, of 372,319 aggregate tonnage, and 1,390 Japanese "ships of the old style," of 511,452 aggregate tonnage.

The vital vessels for use in the Pacific trade are now building at the Mitsubishi dockyards for the Oriental Steamship Company. One is of 13,500 tons and two of 9,250 tons each.

Shipbuilding at the Japanese yards generally is at a very low ebb. Many workmen have been laid off.

In forty years (1858 to 1908) Japan's foreign trade increased from 26,000,000 yen to \$14,498,908 yen.
