ANOTHER CLEAN-UP DAY.

This Time Celebration Ground Gets Share.

Mosier will have another cleaning day on Saturday, June 19th. The day will be spent in cleaning up and putting in shape, the grounds just west and immediately adjoining town, which will be used for the big celebration to be held on July 3rd.

Every man and boy in Mosier and vicinity who wishes to assist Mosier have the biggest and best celebration ever seen here is cordially asked to be on hand Saturday morning, June 19th, at 8 o'clock, with axe, rake, mattock or pitchfork and help clear up the grounds. There will be plenty of room, if sufficient ground is cleared off, to accommodate any crowd that may come, and from all reports, it will be a large one. If the men and boys all turn out and work with a will much can be accomplished in a day or half a day, so if there are any who cannot work all day, half that time will be appreciated by the committee in charge. The idea is to make the grounds as spacious and attractive as possible, so that those coming from a distance will be pleased with the appearance of the place as well as find a delightful spot in which to rest and have a pleasant time.

Don't forget the time—Saturday, June 19th, and the object. Dinner will be provided for those coming from out of town and working for the committee.

**FISH FOR CENTRAL OREGON.**  
A result of Oregon enacting legislation protecting the Salmon of the Columbia is the running of the Royal Chinook up small streams, notably Ochoce and Crooked river and their tributaries. It has been years since that fish has been taken from these streams in any quantities owing to the impossibility of their getting past the nets, traps and wheels in the Columbia. With the government expending many thousands annually in propagation and the state giving the whole product to a few wheelmen, it is hard for the common people to see justice in the procedure. The salmon belong just as much to Prineville as Astoria and any point between the two cities.—Dufur Dispatch.

**OUTDOOR SLEEPING.**  
Sleeping out of doors in Summer is a custom fast growing in favor in this country. It is especially well suited to California, where absence of rain and the relative dryness of the air make extra superfluous. No amount of ventilation can make the air of a sleeping chamber as pure as that of the open, with nothing to obstruct the escape of impurities exhaled with the breath. Even when a complete calm seems to prevail there is always a movement of the atmosphere, so that in an entire change of the surrounding air occurs every second. Doctors in California now generally recommend sleeping in the pen air, and many patients experience much benefit from it.
