THOUSANDS COME FOR BIG DRAWING.
Official announcement and details of the big government lottery by which more than 1,500,000 acres of land in Washington Montana and Idaho will be disposed of was received at the Seattle land office today from Washington D. C., says Oregonian of June 8. The drawing takes place at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, beginning on the morning of August 9, and includes the Spokane reservation, 153,600 acres; the Flathead reservation, 1,230,000 acres and the Coeur d'Alene reservation 310,000 acres. The Spokane reservation is located about 35 miles from Spokane, Wash., the Flathead reservation between Missoula and Kalispell, Mont., and the Coeur d'Alene reservation in Northwest Idaho, on the boundary line between that state and Washington. The methods used at the drawing at Bonesteel, S.D., will be adopted at the drawing. An enormous tent will be erected, and the tons of certificates, each sealed in an envelope, dumped in the center of a large arena. Little boys and girls will dig into the mass, the owners of the first certificate drawn being declared the winner of first choice in the particular reservation in which he sought a homestead.

Many thousands of people from Eastern and Middle West states are expected to immigrate to the Northwest to attend the drawing. The fact that they can take advantage of the low rates to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition for the greater part of their trip is expected to result in the largest attendance at any land drawing in the history of the country. The size of the tracts to be distributed varies from 40 to 160 acres, according to location. The drawing, which will consume three or four days, and possibly a week, will be in charge of James W. Whitten, of the General Land Office at Washington, who has been designated as superintendent of the drawing. Registration for the drawing will begin on July 12 and end on August 5.
