PERFECT SCORE MADE Port Townsend, Wash., June 23.—Perfect marksmanship with 6-inch disappearing rifles was made today by the 63d company, Coast Artillery Corps, Captain C. B. Gilbert, at the first day of target shooting with full service conditions. This is the second instance where Puget Sound district forts have secured a 100 per cent score in the annual tests required by the Department.

The 63d company is stationed at Fort Worden and fired today at an average of 3000 yards, at a target 60x30 feet. Conditions of target practise permit a trial for location of the target and the gunners of the 63d punctured the target's bullseye with the first attempt at location.—Oregonian.
