**ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING.**

The meeting which was called for last Wednesday afternoon at Stroup's Hall was well attended by about fifty of Mosier's representative citizens, who gathered to hear Mr. Biddle Wells' talk on publicity and community advertising. Mr. Wells is a most forceful and interesting speaker. His subject, which he handled in a masterly manner, is one of the most vital importance to Mosier people, and Mr. Wells' hearers were thoroughly convinced of the fact, as was evidenced by the enthusiasm with which they greeted his remarks and the spontaneous subscriptions which were made. Mr. Wells showed how the people of Mosier could secure the best results from community advertising by adopting the plan which he explained in detail, at a nominal cost to the community. The work of systematically advertising the advantages of Mosier will be taken up with the Harriman system, which agrees to put up \$4 for every dollar raised by the community, and will get out the advertising matter in a most attractive form, furnishing pictures, reading matter, etc., all beautifully printed and illustrated, and will furthermore attend to the mailing of the printed copies to any part of the world. What more could Mosier ask? To be sure, as Mr. Wells said, this is not a philanthropic move on the part of the railroad company. They, like the individual, are actuated by selfish motives, but it is selfishness which helps others—puts money in their pockets while adding to their own income. We want the people here to develop the country—that is our business. They want to bring them here. That's their business. But the railroad company is offering us, financially, the big end of the bargain and it is up

to us to take advantage of the offer, and by working with them to develop our section in a much better and quicker way than we could by any other method that could be devised.

About \$100 per month was subscribed at the meeting, and it is confidently expected that the sum of \$1500 will be raised for a publicity advertising fund and that the matter will be taken up at once with the railroad company and that contracts will be signed up and the work got under way.

This is a great move for Mosier and will result in a marked increase in the general business of the town and the prosperity of the entire section.

**MOSIER CELEBRATES THE FOURTH.**

The people of Mosier District turned out en masse last Saturday to celebrate the Nation's birthday. The home crowd was augmented by numbers from The Dalles, Hood River and other places. It was estimated that between four and five hundred people spent the day here. The weather, except for a little wind in the morning, was almost ideal. The Dalles band came down in the early morning and discoursed fine music while the crowd was gathering, and at ten o'clock the grounds began to fill up and the program was begun. The program for the morning consisted of band music, patriotic songs by a Mosier chorus, recitations by Mrs. W. W. Winegar, a solo by Mrs. Howard Porter, an oration by the Rev. G. V. Poling of The Dalles, flag drills, marches, etc.

The Rev. Poling's oration was a masterly effort and elicited applause. Seldom have we listened to such an eloquent and inspiring discourse. Had any one present lacked a sufficient amount of patriotism and love of country before, he must have received enough, listening to Mr. Poling's address, to last him the rest of his life.

Mrs. Winegar's rendition of The Independence Bell was very forceful and received enthusiastic applause, as did the other numbers which she recited.

Mrs. Porter's solo was excellently rendered and well received by an appreciative audience. The flag drill and march by the school children was very pretty and well given.

Miss Lurline Fisher, as the Goddess of Liberty, was all that could be desired.

A basket dinner was served in the grove, to which every one was invited. The crowd was a large one there was enough for

all, in fact, many more could have been fed.

The afternoon sports consisted of contests of various kinds and ball game between Mosier and Belmont, the latter winning by a score. At night a big dance was given in Stroup's Hall, which was largely attended. Taken all together, it was enjoyed by all. The American people seldom fail to enjoy themselves on an occasion of this kind.

**BURNED OUT.**

Retiring to rest last Friday night with the anticipation of spending a pleasant day at the celebration in Mosier on Saturday and awaking about midnight to find their house a mass of flames, and in a very few minutes to be homeless, was the experience of Mr. and Mrs. George Parrish. Mr. Parrish is the Section Foreman here, and his house stood close to the O. R. & N. tracks, near the Mosier creek bridge. A freight train which had been switching in the yards during the night, pulled out about midnight, and in passing the house sparks from the engine fell on the roof. Not long after Mrs. Parrish was awakened by the smoke, and roused the family. Others who saw the light of the burning building, ran to their assistance, but the fire had gained such headway that the family barely escaped in their night clothes, catching up such articles as they could find in their flight. Neighbors succeeded in saving the sewing machine, a few chairs, a little bedding and a bookcase, but everything else, including a \$300 piano, was a total loss, with no insurance. The house, from the outside was and looked like all the other section houses of the company, but inside, Mrs. Parrish had furnished it very nicely, and had many valuable articles which money could not replace. Among other things was a picture of Mr. Parrish's father which he prizes very highly, it being the only one in existence.

The family is homeless, and the property loss falls very heavily upon them. Of course the O. R. & N. will rebuild at once, but will hardly make good the loss of personal property, tho it was incurred by apparent carelessness.
