### APPLE BOX BILL

Walla Walla, July 12—Apprehension has been aroused on the part of the fruitgrowers of the Walla Walla and Touchet valleys regarding the Lafan bill now before congress which proposes to change the size of the standard apple box and which is a substitute for the discredited and defeated Porter bill of a year ago, and with the object in view of preparing to resist it. J. L. Dumas, of this city, president of the Washington State Horticultural society, will start on a two week tour thru the state.

Altho this bill proposes to increase the size of the box only 162 cubic inches instead of 385, as provided in the Porter bill, Mr. Dumas stated yesterday that it is highly objectionable to all the growers of the northwest, and that many of them have already expressed their disapproval. The loss to growers, it is pointed out, would be great.

"Every grower in the northwest is up in arms against this proposed change," he said yesterday, "and there should be organized opposition. It has been asserted by eastern dealers that our box should contain apples equal to 40 lbs. four hoop pecks, as retailers use the peck measure, and that it does not contain that amount.

"The matter came up in Washington last winter in discussing the Porter bill, and it was conclusively shown that our boxes do hold more than enough apples to equal the peck measures in use. These measures are made with wide bottoms and taper to a
