**Mosier Apples Sell at Top Price.**

Joseph Steinhardt, of the firm of Steinhardt & Kelly, apple-buyers of New York City, was in town between trains on Wednesday. His visit here was for the purpose of meeting the Mosier Fruit Growers' Association and making arrangements to secure the apple crop here. Mr. Steinhardt closed, on Tuesday, a contract for the Hood River crop. This firm handled the Hood River crop last year exclusively, and they are out this year for the Mosier crop also, realizing that they could advertise their own business as well as the apple country of Oregon in no better way than by securing both the Hood River and Mosier crops. Before leaving Mr. Steinhardt bought the entire output of Mosier apples at a price far in excess of last year's figures, and very satisfactory to the Association. This was a strategic move on Mr. Steinhardt's part, for, as he stated, he was anxious to secure all of the best apples in the country for the Eastern market, and by getting both the Mosier and Hood River crops he has practically "cornered" the fancy apple market.

**SCHOOL NOTES.**

Monday, Labor Day, was a holiday.
