Buying Mosier Fruit. Mosier is noted for many things besides her high grade apples. Among them are her Italian prunes, which are famous for their size, appearance, flavor, keeping and shipping qualities.

Mr. Irwin Kline, a gentleman who recently came out from Indiana and purchased land in Hood River valley, wanted some good prunes and, hearing about the Mosier variety, recently purchased a hundred pounds of Mr. Lee Evans. The prunes were grown on Mr. Evans' place near town and were the finest in the country.

Mosier is one of the three districts in the West where prunes can be raised that will stand shipping to Eastern markets.

Town Will be Lighted. Through the enterprise of the ladies of the Civic Improvement Club, Mosier streets will be lighted this winter. There will be three gasoline lamps installed at present, and more will be added as circumstances and finances warrant. One lamp is already in, at the intersection of Third avenue and Oregon street, and it is proving most satisfactory in illuminating both streets for a considerable distance. Another lamp will be put in on lower Main street, at the corner of George Chamberlain's real estate office, and the third light will be installed at the corner of Main street and Third avenue. With these three lamps the business section of the town will be fairly well lighted.

As a matter of fact, the town is not visible from the point where she claimed to have seen it, and her testimony only weakened the case for the prisoner. Still, Mosier is growing.
