## HELP CONSERVATION

### President Says Congress Must Enact Necessary Laws.

### CARRY OUT ROOSEVELT POLICIES

looks to People to Enforce Laws Against Monopoly and Not Let Good Times Blind Them.

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 5.—After making one of the longest jumps of his trip and traveling for 25 hours through the state of Oregon, and the northern half of California, President Taft arrived last night at 7:10 p. m.

The president selected for the principal feature of his speech the subject of the conservation of natural resources, in which he declared anew that before many of the Roosevelt policies of conservation can be carried into effect confirmatory and enabling legislation will have to be secured, and he pledged himself to bring all the power he possesses to bear upon congress to pass the laws that are deemed necessary.

Speaking from the car-end at Dunsmuir today, Mr. Taft said:

"I am on a tour of some 13,000 miles and I am trying to gather information as we go with reference to the condition of the country and at the same time to give you a superficial aspect of the man whom it has been your good or bad fortune to elect president. I think that personal touch between the people and those whom you honor by delegating authority temporarily is a good thing, so that you may know when I make my mistakes, and they are represented to you with a great deal of emphasis, that I am still a poor mortal praying for assistance and hoping that you will forgive human error.

"Everywhere in this country I have found evidences of prosperity from Boston to Portland, and if signs do not fail, we are upon an era of business enterprise and expansion that has never been seen in this country before. Now with that I would not have you forget that here are certain responsibilities. We have had evils growing out of our prosperity. Men have seized power by means of accumulation of wealth and its use in methods that are not legal and cannot be approved, by way of monopoly and otherwise. Now, we are attempting by the general law of the United States to suppress that kind of abuse. They were brought to the attention of the people in a marvelous crusade by my predecessor, Theodore Roosevelt, and it is my duty to continue those policies and to enforce them as far as I may and put upon the statute books, or at least recommend to congress that there be put upon the statute books those laws which shall clinch the progress which was made under him, which he preached and which we all look forward to as a permanent condition.

"Now, my fellow citizens, as I look out upon this audience, I feel sure that you are not only healthy in body but healthy in mind; that you are in favor of the good things; that you are in favor of decent government; that you are in favor of decent men and decent women and that you look forward to the future as a time when we shall all grow better. The truth is that money and wealth contribute nothing unless they enable us to make ourselves better, unless they enable us to think something of others and to help others—those who are down—onward in the progress of life. We cannot all be altruists in the sense that we can devote our attention to somebody else all the time, for we have to look after ourselves and our families, but I am sure that in the last generation there has been an improvement throughout our country with reference to a charitable feeling towards all, and a desire on the part of each to help all."

Fernanda Weds Count.  
Paris, Oct. 5.—Miss Fernanda Wanamaker, daughter of Rodman Wanamaker, and granddaughter of John Wanamaker, was married today to Count Arthur de Heeren, son of Count Heeren, of Paris. There were two ceremonies. The first was in the Catholic church with full orchestral accompaniment. This was followed by a Protestant marriage service, the Rev. Alfred G. Cortimer, of Philadelphia, officiating. Henry White, American ambassador, and Marquis Le Muni, Spanish ambassador, were witnesses.

Censorship Is Peculiar.  
London, Oct. 5.—The intricacies of theatrical censorship were responsible tonight for a remarkable entertainment. An American band had been engaged for the season, but when the time came for the opening the manager found that the theater had only been licensed for the production of a play. He therefore wove a play around the band. There was no plot to the so-called play, which consisted merely of a few people strolling around the bandstand, engaged in loud and apparently meaningless conversation.

Sail for Philippines.  
Honolulu, Oct. 5.—The Pacific fleet commanded by Rear-Admiral Stribble, will sail tomorrow afternoon for the Philippines after a month's stay in Hawaiian waters. It is planned to cruise the whole distance at a speed of 13 knots an hour. Shore leave for the men of the fleet will end at midnight. Admiral Stribble has been liberal in the matter of leave since the arrival of the fleet and thousands of sailors have been ashore.

Smugglers Win Battle.  
El Paso, Tex., Oct. 5.—Using their train of pack burros loaded with contraband goods as breastworks, a gang of smugglers battled with a squad of rurales near Sabinas, in the state of Coahuila, Mexico, and came out victorious, forcing the rurales to withdraw and escaping with their goods into the mountains. One smuggler was killed and seven rurales wounded.

## NO PERPETUAL RIGHTS.

### Mining Congress Proposes American Law on Water Power.

Goldfield, Nev., Oct. 5.—The American Mining congress closed its 12th session here after adopting a resolution calling upon the national government to legislate against perpetual franchises for water power or water rights in Western states, and urging that similar state legislation be passed without waiting for congressional action.

The apex law, under which the discoverer of a mineral lode or vein can follow it outside the lines of his claim was another subject of discussion, and its repeal, with the substitution of a law making the side lines of a claim its limits when continued downward vertically, was urged.

Wildcat mining schemes were placed under the ban by the congress, which urged state and national legislation to prevent the operators of such schemes from diverting money of investors that might otherwise be used in developing legitimate properties.

J. H. Richards, of Boise, Idaho, the retiring president of the congress, was given a handsome service by the delegates.

Los Angeles and Spokane have developed a lively rivalry for the next session of the congress. This question will be decided by the executive committee.

### FARMERS FLOCK TO CANADA.

Fully 70,000 American Settlers Have Crossed Border.

Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 5.—American farmers by the tens of thousands are now pouring over the boundary into the Canadian West. According to a statement made by the deputy minister of agriculture at Ottawa, the invasion of Americans into Canada will total over 70,000 for the present year.

In the beginning of this across-boundary movement the newcomers were largely from the Middle states, but this year they are coming from almost every state in the Union. Not only is the quantity satisfactory to Canada, but the quality of settlers is rather improving than otherwise.

Practically, the official report says, 60,000 Americans this season entered Canada, and every man, woman and child was possessed on an average of \$1,000 in stock, cash and effects, meaning that they brought into this country nearly \$60,000,000.

W. J. White, head of the Canadian Immigration agencies in the United States, says that immigration from the United States has increased fully 30 per cent and that next year he expects to see about 115,000 American settlers in the Canadian West.

### NINE DEAD IN ROSLYN MINE.

Fire Follows Gas Explosion—Shaft Is Furnace Blast.

Roslyn, Wash., Oct. 5.—Fifteen men are believed to have been killed or fatally injured in an explosion of gas in the shaft of mine No. 4, of the North-western Improvement company, at 12:45 this afternoon.

The mine in the neighborhood of the shaft is burning fiercely, flames rushing through the shaft with an awful roar. The electric pumps are cut off, and the water supply in the city is very low. It is thought the fire in the shaft will not affect the other mines, but it may be six months before the shaft can be put in working condition again. It is said that the shaft is caving in and other explosions may occur at any time.

Shops Are to Be Doubled.  
Sacramento, Oct. 5.—Reports have been received here to the effect that the New York office of the Western Pacific has sent back plans of the railroad shops to be built in Sacramento with instructions to prepare specifications for buildings double in size. The original plans called for an expenditure of \$750,000 while the proposed shops under the new scheme will cost \$1,500,000.

Further indication of the move, as advanced by local railroad men is that the Western Pacific contemplates running lines up and down the state.

Germany Causes Alarm.  
Madrid, October 5.—Dispatches from Gibraltar today say German steamers are disembarking cannon and large quantities of guns and ammunition at Morocco ports destined for the government. Great Britain and France, it is said, have been informed of the situation and while they are guarding neutrally, they are seeking by diplomacy to prevent a collision. The attitude of the sultan is said to have caused ministerial anxiety. Fears are entertained that he may desire to incite a general war.

Pope Too Ill to Receive.  
Rome, Oct. 5.—For several days the pope has been ill, but he continued to see visitors, hoping to overcome what is considered a slight indisposition. Yesterday he received in audience one of the archbishops, who noticed that the pontiff appeared tired and languid. After the audience the symptoms became aggravated, there being considerable pain and swelling in the leg, which indicated recurrence of the gout. Although the attack is slight, the pope's doctors have insisted upon complete rest and audiences are suspended.

Duel Over Girl Is Fatal.  
San Diego, Cal., Oct. 5.—Earl Davis, who was stabbed nine times by Earl Lynell in a duel over a girl on the night of September 18, died this afternoon of tetanus, or lockjaw. Davis was 17 years old; Lynell is also 17. Clotilde Montez, the Spanish girl over whom the fight took place, is 14. Lynell took to the mountains and is still at large. The police are now scouring the country for him. A knife thrust produced blood poisoning.

St. Yves to Run No More.  
Montreal, Oct. 5.—Henri St. Yves, the famous French long-distance runner, collapsed in the 23d mile of a race here today. Physicians declared his heart was affected and that he probably would be unable to run again. His opponent, Hans Holmer, of Quebec, finished strong, covering the Marathon distance in 2:32:40, a new record, if the track is found to measure correctly.

## SPORT FOR THE VERY RICH.

### Thousand-Ton Steam Yacht Cost \$50,000 for Six Months' Use.

It would be folly for any man with an income of less than a million a year to build or to buy a modern steam yacht of 1,000 tons or 300 feet over all length, for she would cost to build not less than \$1,000 a foot, or \$300,000 complete. If a few years old she might be purchased at a third less in the open market.

To put such a vessel in commission to live on board continuously or at intervals during six months of the year, and to entertain friends aboard would cost approximately \$8,000 and \$50,000. The captain receives on an average \$175 a month, the chief engineer \$149 the chief steward \$100, and the chief officer from \$75 to \$100 a month, according to his experience and ability as a navigator. If a second mate is carried he would be paid \$60, and a second steward about the same amount. The assistant engineer would receive \$100 and the bosun about \$50 a month.

Such a yacht would carry twenty men before the mast—a crew of thirty-five, including the firemen—and each of the crew would be paid \$40 a month. The launch man gets perhaps \$10 a month extra. All the officers and crew are, of course, boarded by the owner, and it costs him on the average 75 cents a head a meal to feed them.

It would be extremely difficult to establish a standard or to strike an average in the matter of expense in provisioning a yacht, for it depends entirely upon the individuality of the owner—the man, and sometimes the woman, who pays the bills. On board such a yacht, for instance, says Country Life in America, there is always an abundance of the best of everything that the market affords. For a cruise of, say, six weeks it costs about \$2,000 properly to stock a yacht of this size with provisions, exclusive of the fresh meat and ice, which may add \$250 to the bill.

Coal is an important item of expense to be reckoned with where a full power steam yacht is concerned. Three hundred tons a month is a conservative estimate of the amount consumed and that would cost the owner in the neighborhood of \$10,000 for six months. Then there will be perhaps \$500 for dry docking and painting for the season, \$250 for laundry work, \$100 for oil for the main engines and the launch, and \$1,000 extra for sundries, such as pilotage, new ropes and hawsers, lamps, compass adjustment and wharf charges, all of which are included in the above original estimate.

Some owners who have smaller steam yachts say whose summer homes are on the Sound or the Hudson use them in a practical way for traveling to and from their business. Down at the Battery almost any morning fast launches may be seen bringing an owner and his guests ashore from a trim yacht in the stream that has just arrived either from Larchmont, Ardsley or Atlantic Highlands.

M. C. D. Borden's 133-foot steam yacht, Little Sovereign, new this year, brings him up from Atlantic Highlands every morning at a speed that astonishes the passengers on the Sandy Hook boats, for she is now said to be the fastest yacht of her dimensions in the United States. If not in the world. She covered a mile in 1:45 on a trial trip, which is at the rate of 33.96 knots, or 39.10 statute miles an hour. Few torpedo boats can beat that time. It cost Mr. Borden something over \$100,000 to get the speed and the comfort afforded by this handsome white flier with her three rakish smokestacks, which are her distinguishing features.

Why We Say "Yours Sincerely."  
Have you ever reflected, when you finish up your letter, "Yours sincerely, John Smith," why you do so, or whence came the origin of this epistolary method of subscribing to your state of mind in regard to any particular correspondent? Well, if you subscribed yourself, "Yours without awe, John Smith," it would amount to the same thing. Here's how:

When the Roman jurymen returned their verdicts they usually did so on a wax tablet. In cases, however, where the verdict was overwhelmingly in favor of a person on trial for any offense they were allowed to give their verdict "sine cera," that is to say, without wax, without going to the formality of inscribing their verdict on the wax tablet (cera). So, when you subscribe yourself "Yours sincerely" to a person you mean—when you are serious, of course—that your regard for him is above board. "Yours faithfully" is the business style; "Yours truly" is the usual form; and "Yours, etc.," the most unparagonable of epistolary atrocities, according to the unwritten code.
