DEATH OF D. A. STURGESS. Word was received yesterday afternoon that Daniel A. Sturgess had died at the hospital in The Dalles, from a complication of diseases.

Mr. Sturgess had been under treatment for some time. He made occasional trips to Mosier to look after his affairs and each time would remark that he felt he was getting better. He came down from The Dalles on Wednesday last and his friends were shocked at the great change in his appearance. The exertion of the trip was too much for him and upon his return to the hospital he grew rapidly weaker until the end came yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Sturgess was a native of Ohio, and was 59 years of age. He had lived in this immediate neighborhood for thirty years and was held in high esteem by everyone. He leaves three sons and a brother, N. P. Sturgess, to mourn his death.

The funeral will take place tomorrow at Mosier, interment being in Odd Fellows cemetery.

About Fence Posts. It is estimated that it costs the farmers of Iowa \$1,495,000 a year to renew their fence posts. Other states, with smaller farms, use more posts than Iowa, so the post bill is enormous.

But why buy posts? Every farmer who has a home of his own should raise his own posts. It takes about ten years to grow a fence post but there is land on almost every farm that has nothing else to do. By utilizing these waste places the farmers could pocket that million dollars that goes to the various lumber companies.

But it doesn't take ten years to get posts if you make them of cement. The cement post does not rot, breaks only under unusual strain, and needs no renewal. A good cement post costs a little more than a good wood post but the investment is permanent while the wood post has to be renewed about every ten years or oftener unless the very best seasoned posts were used.—ex.

NEW STEAMER FOR OPEN RIVER FLEET.

Dorsey B. Smith, superintendent of the Open River Transportation Company, has chartered the steamer Sarah Dixon to operate between Portland and Big Eddy, carrying general cargo up and wheat down. The Dixon made her first trip up yesterday. She will "run wild" until the congestion of freight has been sufficiently reduced to permit of her being placed on a regular schedule. The steamer J. N. Teal will continue making three round trips weekly.

The Sarah Dixon will be in command of Captain W. P. Short and on her first trip up carried 150 tons of general cargo, nearly all of which was destined for Lewiston and points to Snake River. On the upper Columbia and Snake rivers the steamers Inland Empire and Twin Cities are in commission and are being taxed to the utmost to handle all the freight which is being offered.—Glacier.
