This will be a solid car of Spitzenburgs and is consigned to Steinhart & Kelly of New York City. Mr. E. D. Howe has perhaps the most remarkable crop of Spitzenburgs in the valley this year and among other fine apples of this variety he has sent in for shipment are 16 boxes of fancy 45s and at \$3 a box these apples will bring Mr. Howe about 6.6c each. It is believed that the apple crop will show up better than was first expected, and a smile is beginning to appear on the faces of some of the growers that it does the heart good to see. Geo. Carroll brought in a fine specimen of a Glory Mundi on Wednesday. The apple was well shaped and weighed just 26 ounces.
