PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF MOSIER

Through the courtesy of Mrs. Gove, the principal of the Mosier schools, it was the privilege of a representative of the Bulletin to be present at the chapel exercises of the school yesterday morning. It was a rare treat, and gave one an opportunity to observe the splendid control the teachers, Mrs. Gove and Miss Booth, have over their pupils, as well as to note the remarkable proficiency attained in music after but five lessons. Music is a department added but very recently to the curriculum, and has already proven quite popular and profitable.

There are now 65 pupils enrolled, 28 in the principal's room, and 37 under the guidance of Miss Booth. A teacher's task is a trying one at best, and these ladies certainly deserve unstinted praise and credit for the successful manner in which they conduct their respective departments. They are ably seconded by the school board which is taking an active interest in the welfare of the school. The board have visited the school twice during the past week and many improvements are noted—the furnace and air shaft ventilators have been repaired; window boards placed in position, which greatly aid in ventilating the school room.

The janitor service is improving, and it is thought will continue as rapidly as the present incumbent realizes the importance of his position. The success of a school does not only rest upon the teachers and directors, but the janitor work is by no means least in creating an ideal condition, and the pupils themselves should cooperate in the perfection in all the school environments.

The fuel supply is adequate for the rigors of the winter months, the basement being well packed with many cords of both oak and pine, thus insuring comfort for the inclement weather to be experienced later on.

DEATH OF GEO. IRELAND
George Ireland, or "Grandpa" Ireland, as he was familiarly called by all the countryside, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. V. C. Young, last night at 6 o'clock, after a brief illness of three days. The direct cause of death was a stroke of paralysis, which he suffered last Tuesday.

Mr. Ireland was a native of England, and was 73 years of age. He came to America at the age of 16 years, living in Illinois and Missouri. In 1892 he moved with his family to Mosier, where he has lived since. Besides a wife he leaves a daughter, Mrs. V. C. Young, and three step children. The latter are John and Ed Evans of Mosier, and Mrs. Mary Parrish of Colorado.

The funeral will be held from the Baptist church tomorrow at 11 o'clock. Interment in Odd Fellows' cemetery.


