MOSIER TO THE FORE

While Mosier District is still in its infancy and the outside world knows comparatively little about the wonderful advantages it has to offer in the way of natural advantages such as soil, climate, healthfulness and magnificent scenery, and above all, the fact that we raise the finest apples that can be grown anywhere in the United States, still the outside world is learning of these things, which is proven by the many investments in land which have been made here in the past two months by homeseekers and investors from all sections of the country.

The recent transfers of property made in this district have included deals amounting to \$30,000 or more and were made by parties whose intention it is to further improve the properties they bought and make of them either fine summer homes or commercial orchards, or both. In fact, it is understood that a number of these investors intend highly developing their property and building modern country residences, where they will sojourn during the summer months.

Allen, of Medford, president of the Pacific & Eastern Railroad, was in Portland yesterday in search of additional workmen to be employed in building that road from Medford toward Crater Lake. Between 300 and 400 men are already employed on the extension of this line, which may connect with either the Oregon Trunk or the Deschutes Railroad, being constructed into Central Oregon from the Columbia River by the Hill and Harriman interests, respectively.

When the natural conditions of this section have been properly exploited the thousands of acres of fine land that are now covered with timber will be snapped up by the wise ones until the entire country will present the appearance of the thickly settled countries of the older states, and Mosier will come into her own.

APPLE GROWERS PROTEST.

Mosier, Ore., Nov. 6, 1909. At a meeting of the Mosier Horticultural Society today the following resolutions were unanimously passed:

WHEREAS, the fruit growers of the Northwest have by diligent practice and careful study adopted boxes of suitable dimensions for apples, and such box contains more than the Winchester bushel, U. S. Standard measure, and

WHEREAS, these boxes are widely known to the growers of apples in the Northwest, and to the trade the world over, and is satisfactory both for packing and shipping purposes, and,

WHEREAS, there is a bill introduced into Congress known as the Lafean Bill, regulating the size of boxes and grading of apples by which our present system of packing will be demoralized and the contents of the box will be increased, and a standard for grade is to be adopted which is far below our present system of grading, causing much loss to the growers; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that we ask our representatives and senators in Congress to oppose the passage of said bill, and that we send a delegate to the meeting called at Spokane, to be held November 16th, 1909, for the purpose of considering a protest to Congress against the passage of the Lafean bill; and, further, be it

RESOLVED, that if said bill be favorably considered by the fruit growers in Eastern states and Congress, so as to become a law, that an amendment be added, permitting the Western states to use the boxes now known as "Standard" and "Special" and marking same "Pacific," also, that the grades be marked as to quality, "Fancy" and "Choice," either of which shall exceed U. S. Standard grade as is now set forth in the Lafean bill; and, that as to size of apples in the box.

Mr. Allen announced that it is the intention of the owners of the Pacific & Eastern to complete its projected construction into Central Oregon in two years. He also said it was immaterial with his company as to whether the desired connections were made with the Hill or the Harriman road, but he intimated it would be the purpose of the Medford road to connect, if possible, with whichever railroad was first constructed into Central Oregon from the Columbia River.
