As a result of the recent heavy rains, also lack of vigilance on the part of the track watcher on main line of the O. R. & N., Tom Rogers, a freight engineer, was killed and his fireman injured, when the engine ran into a big boulder which had slipped onto the track from the bank above, early last Monday morning. The line was tied up for eight or ten hours and traffic was demoralized, not until getting thru from the west until Tuesday morning. The R. R. Co. has put extra

watchers on the line to prevent a recurrence of the catastrophe. Tom Rogers, the dead engineer, was a young man and had been on this run about six weeks. He leaves a young wife and small children in Portland.
