ONE HUNDRED PEOPLE WILL ATTEND BOOSTER MEETING.

Mosier will be the scene of a big booster meeting Saturday night. The invitation extended to the business men of The Dalles has been accepted, a special train has been chartered, and about 100 people are going to help "whoop it up" for one of the most progressive little towns in Oregon.

The Mosier people are boosters of a pronounced type, and they always go one better than anyone else. Last winter when the new hotel was re-christened and the big banquet and booster meeting was held, Mosier was represented by prominent citizens and they came under the most unfavorable weather conditions, the storm making trouble for the railroads, and it was extremely uncertain whether they could reach The Dalles. But they took the chance and came, and were there too with their boost; and it was not confined to Mosier, but to the whole of Wasco county.

The special train will leave the O. R. & N. depot at 7.40 in the evening, and, returning, will leave Mosier about 11 o'clock. Their noise has been heard in every part of the United States, and it is showing results every day. The speakers enlarged upon the theory that a good teacher should fit herself morally, mentally, spiritually and physically for the task of properly training the children and fitting them for their life work as good useful citizens. They stated a lamentable fact that many of them were not so fitted in any of these respects, and that they so often practiced on the children at the children's expense.

The Mosier Orchestra furnished music, and Miss Bertha Booth rendered an instrumental solo. The teachers of the Mosier school particularly appreciate the fact that this meeting was held here and take the opportunity through this paper to express their thanks.
