SCHOOL CLOSES.

Stroup's Hall was crowded last Wednesday evening to witness the closing exercises of the Mosier public school. The hall was artistically decorated with fir boughs and Oregon Grape, the latter predominating, interwoven with Syringa and white roses, while across the front of the platform, entwined in the festoon of green, ran broad ribbons of blue and gold--the class colors. Vases of cut flowers adorned the platform. The class motto, "Climb," appeared in large letters of blue and gold on the wall.

The program, as printed, was carried out, the pupils rendering several songs in a very creditable manner. Miss Booth's instrumental solo was much appreciated.

Rev. B. A. Warren, of The Dalles, delivered the class address, which was interesting and instructive and was listened to with close attention.

Superintendent Neff, in well chosen words, then presented the diplomas to the three graduates, Alefara Haacke, Mattie Hudson and Wendell Taylor. In concluding his remarks, Mr. Neff spoke of the disadvantage under which the teachers have been working on account of the number of pupils and grades, pointing out the difficulty in giving each class and grade the proper amount of time, and advised the school board to secure a third teacher for the fall term, as there will be an increased attendance in the fall.

There will be too many pupils for two teachers to handle properly, and the necessity is apparent of either securing another teacher or dropping the ninth and tenth grades. The latter alternative would be the most unfortunate, as Mosier has prided herself on her excellent school facilities and the elimination of two important grades would seriously handicap the efficiency of the school.

At the conclusion of the exercises, ice cream, cake and strawberries were served, a unique feature of the ice cream being that it was prepared in colors of blue and gold.

The graduates' bouquets of carnations and roses were presented by the teachers, Mrs. Gove also presenting each with a class pin and a book.

The teachers, Mrs. Gove as principal and Miss Booth as her able assistant, are to be congratulated on the successful termination of the school year, and the school board and patrons generally are well pleased to have them take charge of the school another year.

NATURE ASSISTS

APPLE GROWERS.

The Hood River News says: "We learn from one of the prominent orchardists in the valley that nature is lending a helping hand in the orchards this spring. The apples are thinning themselves very nicely, saving much labor and expense. The apples remaining on the trees are firm, perfectly shaped and clear of blemish, making the prospects of a fine crop perfect."

"So far no fungus generally has appeared, and as compared with last year, no brown aphid. There is occasionally some aphid seen, but the appearance of pests of any kind is normal. It is expected that the apple harvest, like the berries, will begin early this year, and be of unusual quality as well as quantity."

Fruit Association Buys Dryer.

The Mosier Fruit Growers' Association last week purchased the old fruit dryer building which stands directly east of the packing house. The purchase was made for two reasons. First, in order to secure room to build an addition to the packing house and second, to remove danger from their packing plant.

The old dryer has served its purpose, but for several years it

has been a menace to the buildings in the immediate vicinity, as well as to the entire town for, since it has been abandoned it has been the rendezvous for tramps at all seasons of the year and a play house for the boys of the town who, like the other irresponsible persons, have been careless with matches. Fortunately, no fire has as yet been started as a consequence, but it is liable to occur at any time and it has been a bugbear to the citizens, particularly as there is no fire protection here. Should a fire once start in the old shack and gain headway with a wind blowing from the west, the probability is that a greater part of the town would be wiped out.

It is the intention of the Association to tear down the dryer as soon as possible and build a forty foot addition onto the east end of the packing house, which will be used as a store room for boxes, crates, spraying materials, etc. The office will also be moved into the new part. This will give considerable additional space for the packing of fruit.

SPiRiT OF THE DALLES.

That The Dalles is in the booster column, and away up at the head of that, will be proven at the Portland Rose Festival. The business men of the Cherry City have asked the management of the festival that one day be dedicated for The Dalles. It is stated that every business house in The Dalles will close on that day, and that a thousand of the citizens at least will attend the rose festival. The Dalles roses and The Dalles fruit will be exhibited in some prominent store window in Portland. The Dalles people are wide awake, and know how to gain publicity.

Some of the younger people will be pleased to learn that kissing has at last received the approval of the medical fraternity. Dr. A. M. Worthington, of the medical school at Harvard, an expert on bacteria, says that there is no reason whatever why healthy and well-intentioned couples should not indulge in kissing to their heart's content! For a long time many scientists have advanced the theory that kissing is dangerous, on the grounds that through this practice microbes are transmitted from one person to another, resulting in the illness of one or both parties. On being asked as to whether kissing was harmful, Dr. Worthington said: "Kissing harmful? Certainly not. We are quite sure that the worthy doctor's statement will at least meet with the approval of some of the younger Mosierites, for, already, we can in fancy hear the sigh of relief which will escape from many a burdened mind as a result of the doctor's research.
