Saturday's School Meeting

The school meeting held last Saturday afternoon at the schoolhouse, was well attended and enthusiastic. The meeting was called to order at 2:30 by the chairman, Geo. Wood, who, after the reading of the minutes of the special meeting, which explained the call for this meeting, called for expression of opinions of those present regarding the erection of an addition to the schoolhouse. It was unanimously decided that an addition was needed, and the method of raising funds for the project was discussed. Arguments in favor of bonding the district, and of a special tax levy were given, but when put to vote the result was 19 to 1 in favor of bonding.

It was decided to build and finish two rooms the size of the present rooms, and bids for the building will be called for. It is hoped to have the addition finished in time for the opening of the Fall term.
