Mr. Phillips, who has traveled all over the West, has come to the conclusion that he wants to settle down, and is looking over Mosier with that end in view. While he did not decide on just what he would do, it is probable that he will return in the near future.

John Minto, who proves himself something of an authority on such matters says: "Hood River apple-growers have shown that the civilized world is within commercial reach of the Pacific orchardists, and it has long been demonstrated that wherever the fir, spruce, pine and hemlock trees grow, apple orchards will grow. Irrigation will produce the largest fruits of any given kind, but such fruits will be inferior in flavor and keeping qualities. It follows that Oregon has millions of the best of apple lands yet untouched. The writer has recently been on the seaward side of the Coast Range and also on the west side of the Cascades. He has concluded that of the two regions, the Cascades will be best for fruit growing, and the Coast Range for dairying. In either district, the home-builder should get on the ground as soon as possible after it has been logged off and burned over. I was particularly impressed with this view in looking over the ground of the fire of three years ago near Detroit. The sooner it is sold for orchard land, the better."
