Wanted—County Commissioner

This part of Wasco county needs and deserves representation at the county seat. We need a county commissioner, and are entitled to one. No doubt each section of the county feels the same way. Wasco county being so large is not properly represented anyway, with but two commissioners. A commissioner in the east or south part of the county will naturally work harder for the interests of his section than he will for that part of the county in which he has no particular interest. This should not be the case, but it is. Naturally, then, a section that is not represented gets mighty little consideration. Western Wasco had a commissioner for a short time, before Hood River county was set apart, but since then Mosier district has been left with no one to look after its interests. We are casting no reflections upon the present commissioners, who are no doubt doing good work in their own territory; we simply need a number of things here—principally good roads and good bridges. We have neither, and no section of the county needs them more than does this. With the large shipment of fruit, increasing each year, we need good roads over which to haul it to the station.

Good roads in this section will greatly enhance the value of property, which means added revenue to the county in taxation.

The people of Mosier District feel that they are entitled to more consideration than they receive, as in the matter of taxation, they pay on one acre of improved land ten times the amount of taxes which the people pay in the eastern and southern parts of the county.

There are a number of residents here who, we believe, would serve the county and this district well. It is the duty of some one of them to allow his name to appear as a candidate at the primary election. It is certain that if we want anything we will have to hustle for it.

Word was received yesterday of the death of Mrs. Ed. Wood on Wednesday night at her home in Portland. The body will be taken to The Dalles today, where the funeral services will be held at 2 p. m.

Are Cascade Mountains Moving Toward River

Just at noon Tuesday a large mass of rock became detached from the Red Bluff and crashed down into the valley below with a terrific noise, raising a dust that could be seen several miles. It is stated by parties that have been on top of the red bluff recently that a large crack has opened about 50 to 100 feet back from the edge, which is ten feet wide and from 40 to 100 feet deep. By one party at least this crevice has been followed for more than a mile and it is believed that it extends across the entire length of the bluff. It is claimed by some that the red bluff is continually moving toward the Columbia river. If so the movement is imperceptibly slow, and yet this crack indicates a movement of some kind. The well known movement on the Oregon side, where the O. R. & N. have had to rebuild their tracks several times, would naturally give rise to the rumor that this side is also moving. The red bluff is the supposed abutment of the Bridge of the Gods on the north side. If the mountains on both sides of the river are actually moving toward each other it would seem that the ancient Indian legend were really true; that the Bridge of the Gods did exist at one time and the pressure being removed by its fall the expansion of the mountains north and south pushes the two ends of the bridge towards each other. Or perhaps nature is trying to build another bridge. - Skamania Pioneer.
