OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Oct. 4 (Special)—Under the auspices of the Harriman lines, W. E. Benton is interesting Oregon communities in making exhibits at the United States Land and Irrigation Exposition, to be held in Chicago November 19 to Dec. 4.

Features of the showing at Chicago will be fruit, grain, dairying and hogs. Each section of the state should take the fullest possible advantage of this opportunity to exploit its resources.

The Forest Service plans the seeding of between 5000 and 6000 acres of burned-over lands at a cost of approximately \$20,000. About 700 acres situated at the Bull Run watershed, the source of Portland's water supply, will be reforested in this way.

Tillamook and Bay City have taken effective steps to secure the improvement of their harbors. The port commissions of these two cities will co-operate with the government in the work and will add to the fund provided for the purpose in the rivers and harbors appropriation.

Oregon leads the whole country in apple production this season, according to the latest report of the Department of Agriculture, which deals with orchard conditions up to September 1.

A remarkable telescope that enables men stationed at Fort Stevens to detect the approach of an enemy while they are still more than 22 miles off shore has just been installed there.

Wasco County's Vote

The following is a summary of the votes cast at the recent primary election. We clip this from the Hood River News:

County Clerk F. R. Angle, City Recorder P. B. Davis, and Justice J. A. Douthitt completed canvassing the primary election returns for Wasco county Friday and, according to The Dalles Chronicle, W. R. Ellis carried the county for the Republican nomination for congressman by the smallest possible plurality, one, receiving 310 votes to 309 polled by A. W. Lafferty, the successful candidate.

There were 775 Republican votes cast, a little more than half of the registered vote, 1378. One hundred and ninety Democrats voted, less than half of the Democratic registration in the county, 425.

For circuit judge S. W. Stark got 473 votes in Wasco out of 775.

The following county officers were nominated, without opposition, for re-election by the Republicans by the following votes:

Sheriff Chrisman, 755; County Clerk Angle, 737; Treasurer Gunning, 737; Surveyor Mohr, 715; Coroner Burget, 693.

Herbert C. Rooper of Antelope, incumbent, received the nomination for county commissioner, getting 400 votes to 337 cast for D. P. Harvey, of Mosier, his opponent.

The vote for joint representative was as follows: Frank M. Gill, of Dufur, 495; Alex Stewart, of Mosier, 355; John L. Henderson, of Hood River, 323; J. F. Watt, of Hood River, 161.

Gill and Henderson were elected, the latter receiving enough votes in Hood River county to win out over Stewart. Lane Smith received 43 Democratic votes and was nominated as a candidate for sheriff.

Agriculture in Alaska The following taken from an exchange concerning Alaska will be of interest to Bulletin readers:

Special Agent McKenzie, who supervised the taking of the recent census of Alaska, has made a report containing other matters of interest than the statistics of population. In addition to enumerating the inhabitants it was his duty to collect facts regarding mining and agriculture.

"Agriculture in this portion of Alaska is yet in its infancy," says the census agent, "but it has arrived at such proportions as to be considered almost wonderful in its results. If all the returns are taken they will show a very remarkable condition when it is considered that it is a condition existing within the Arctic circle."
