OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Oct. 11 (Special).
—The apple crop of Oregon for
1910 is estimated to be 1600 car-
loads or approximately 1,000,000
boxes. The value of the crop is
\$2,000,000. Oregon has 93 per
cent of a full crop.

Oregon orchards yielded prunes
this year estimated at 15,000,000
pounds. Quantity and quality
are superior to the 1909 crop.
Prunes will bring the state about
\$1,250,000 this season.

The peach crop has been the
largest in the history of the state.
Grapes of the Rogue River Val-
ley, the Willamette Valley, The
Dallies and Eastern Oregon are
excellent in quality and appear-
ance, while the yield is large.

The largest fruit and vegetable
evaporator in the United States
is located at Dayton, Yamhill
County.

The Willamette Valley pro-
duced 100,000 bales of first grade
hops this season, as compared
with a yield of 82,000 bales last
season.

Oregon's cranberry harvest
has been heavy. Four hundred
bushels an acre, with a clear
profit of \$2 a bushel, is not an
unusual yield for Western Ore-
gon marshes.

An industrial bureau has been
established by the Portland Com-
mercial Club, with R. W. Ray-
mond at its head. The new ad-
junct to the Club will aid in the
establishment of factories in the
state at large and at Portland.

During the past five years,
statistics show that Oregon has
increased 60 per cent in manu-
facturing.

It is expected that 20,000 wool
growers will visit Portland dur-
ing January next, when the
National Association of Wool
Growers will hold its annual con-
vention in that city.

Oregon's public lands comprise
18,225,694 acres. Eastern Ore-
gon has 500,000 acres of school
land. Because of attractive
colonist rates in effect this Fall,
this immigration to Oregon has
been greater than ever before in
a like period.

The total value of agricultural
products of the state for the cur-
rent season is given at \$115,000,
000.

Oregon harvested 17,000,000
bushels of wheat this season,
11,000,000 bushels of oats 6,000,
000 bushels of potatoes, 2,000,
000 pounds of wool and 100,000,
000 bales of hops.

Portland building statistics
show a decided increase. Sep-
tember 1910, 606 permits, value
\$1,391,260; September, 1909, 509
permits, value \$1,288,300.

Oregon banks have increased
in number since 1909 from 204 to
232. Total deposits for Septem-
ber this year were \$142,670,514,
an increase over 1909 of \$20,668,
666. The surplus this year is
\$4,798,663. Portland banks show
an increase of \$9,712,506 over the
same period of last year.

Lane County has 38 lumber
mills with an annual cut of 200,
000,000 feet.

Real Estate Transfers

sin. The purchaser will have
ten acres cleared this Fall, and
will set to fruit trees in the
Spring.

THE SUMPTER MINING
CONGRESS

Called for Oct. 20-21, the meet-
ing will do much in promoting
Mining in the Northwest

Sumpter, Ore., Oct. 12.

In the past few months the re-
newal of mining activity in East-
ern Oregon has become so gen-
eral that it is realized that the
time is ripe for the holding of a
Mining Congress or convention
of the mining men of the North-
west. As Sumpter is in the
heart of a district that produces
more than 50 per cent of the gold
taken out in the state of Oregon,
it is thought to be the most logi-
cal point for holding the meeting.

The primary object of the con-
gress is to take up for discussion
and organized action matters of
importance to the mining indus-
try in the Northwest, or of
national import to mining for
that matter. Men of reputation
in the mining world will be here
from distant points to talk on
mining topics.

The congress will be held on
the 20th and 21st of this month,
and the proposition is backed by
the mining and business men of
Sumpter. So confident are they
of the success of the congress
that they have contributed a
large fund for properly enter-
taining visitors and paying ex-
penses of the meeting. Invita-
tions have been sent in all di-
rections to mining and other
men of note to attend, and the
indications are that a large as-
semblage will be on hand.

Sumpter will take the oppor-
tunity presented by this congress
of showing what is really con-
tained in the Sumpter mining
district. Attention will be di-
rected to the great possibilities
for future operations. The great
scope of the district will also be
advanced, and in this way it may
be shown what will be the best
for future treatment of the vast
amount of ledge matter that lies
within the mountains of Eastern
Oregon.

The program of the congress
has not as yet been fully pre-
pared, but at this early date it is
safe to state that it will be both
interesting and instructive to
every person in any manner in-
terested in mining. Therefore a
cordial invitation is extended to
all mining men and people in-
terested in mining to attend the
convention.

Prohibition and Liquor Evils.

Prohibition was one of the is-
sues of the recent political up-
heaval in Maine, in which Demo-
crats carried the state. Demo-
crats will at once repeal the Stur-
gis law, which authorizes the
Governor to send commissioners
into any county to ferret out pro-
hibition law offenders. It was
natural, of course, for prohibition
enthusiasts to demand enforce-
ment of the law by that method,
against the apathy of the state's
ordinary officials of prosecution.

In Oregon the demand has been
made frequently that the Govern-
or or the Attorney-General be
empowered to force prosecuting
officials to ferret out liquor of-

fenders. But in Maine it was
found that the Sturgis law is an
implement of political tyranny
and of outrageous inquisition and
is no remedy for abatement of
liquor evils.

So that the Sturgis law will be
repealed; and if Democrats can
muster two-thirds the Legisla-
ture, with aid of a few Republi-
can votes, they will submit the
prohibition clause of the state
constitution for repeal by popular
vote. That vote, if taken now,
would evidently repeal the pro-
hibition law.

Evils of liquor traffic—or
rather of liquor drinking—are
self-evident and no right-think-
ing person denies them. If it is
