OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore., Oct. 18 (Special) —Oregon not only raises the best sheep in the Union, but they will compare favorably with any in the world, in the opinion of Geo. W. McKnight, of Vale, president of the Oregon Wool Growers Association. He expects this fact will be demonstrated at the coming convention of the National Wool Growers Association which opens in Portland on January 4.

"We shall have the greatest sheep show ever held in Oregon," he said. "Our breeders will have a great chance to show their stock, and if we win in the coming competition they can safely take their sheep anywhere in the world."

The Portland convention of the National Wool Growers Association, which is the oldest livestock organization in the United States, will be the biggest in the history of that organization. The state organization of wool growers will meet in Portland just before the National convention, the exact date to be determined later.

Oregon's apple show is receiving very wide attention. Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Ry., is taking interest in the coming exhibit and offers a cash prize of \$250 for the best exhibit of apples from any district tributary to the Great Northern. Two cash prizes of \$250 each will be presented for the best exhibits of apples. Fruit growers of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will be eligible in these two classes.

Portland has accomplished more hard-surface paving since the first of January than any other city of like population in the United States, 50 miles of hard-surface streets having been laid since that date and 10 or 15 additional miles will be completed before Winter sets in in earnest. This has been a record year for Portland in street paving and 50 additional miles are already contracted for next year.

The Lane County Apple Show, to be held at Eugene October 20, 21, and 22, under the auspices of the merchants and the Commercial Club of that city, promises to make a fine showing of Willamette Valley apples. A long list of prizes has been arranged and there is no fee for entries, of which there will undoubtedly be a large number. Lane County is growing apples that would be hard to beat anywhere, and the visitor to Eugene on the above dates will see these Valley beauties in their perfection.

The British tramp steamer, Knight of the Garter, cleared from Portland the latter part of last week with the biggest cargo of lumber ever floated at this or any other port. She carries 5,300,000 feet of fir lumber, weighing approximately 8,745 net tons and valued at \$60,000. It is stated that to produce this one cargo of finished lumber it would require 160 acres of the best standing timber in the Pacific Northwest. The destination of the steamer is North China, where a part of the cargo, consisting of very large square timbers, will be re-sawed by hand.

A meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Oregon, Washington and California will be held at San Francisco in November, to advance the movement for a battleship fleet for the Pacific Coast. It is expected that Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans will attend the meeting, and will assist in determining the best method of presenting the subject to Congress at its next session.

Spokane Apple Show

Educate The Voter

The cartoon in last Saturday's Oregonian is very suggestive and opportune. It sets the average voter to thinking, and wondering how in the world he is going to answer the 32 questions which will confront him on election day. Without an intelligent understanding of the merits of the multitudinous amendments, he will be at a loss as to how he wants, or ought, to vote. In fact, it is too much to expect him to vote intelligently on all or any of them unless he takes time to study them carefully. And, as he generally figures that they do not interest or affect him particularly, he will not take the necessary time to understand them.

And right here is where the individual, corporation or party most vitally interested in the separate measurements to be considered, should get busy and do some rudimentary "a b c" work; that is, educate the aforesaid average voter as to the merits or demerits of these measures. This can only be done by going among the voters and explaining to them. Without knowing anything about these measures, the voter is quite as apt to vote against a good measure as he is to vote for a poor one. Meetings should be advertised in advance and the parties interested in or against any measure could send out their best speakers and show the voter why he should or should not vote for it. In this way the public will be better able to know how to vote on November 8th.

Mosier Should Exhibit

It is up to Mosier to have her best apple exhibit at the Hood River Apple Fair and also at Portland. The failure to make an exhibit at The Dalles created not a little comment as this section is able to make as fine a showing as any in the country. Individuals claimed they could not possibly take the time to prepare their exhibits as the weather was uncertain and they had to harvest the apple crop. It should certainly be someone's business to see that a good exhibit, if only a dozen boxes, be collected and taken to Hood River and Portland, to show what Mosier can do.

There is no doubt that individual growers would be willing and glad to furnish the fruit if the Commercial Club would attend to collecting, packing and shipping it and then secure some one to look after it when placed on exhibition. In no other way can Mosier and Mosier fruit be so well advertised among the thousands of Easterners who will flock to the Pacific Northwest this fall.

It is time to get busy along this line.

Physical Training For Women

One of the most valuable courses at the University of Oregon for women is the Physical Culture course, which involves special training for teachers of gymnastics, given by Dr. Bertha Stuart. The course is largely pre-medical, but carries special work in gymnastic training, the theory of gymnastics, corrective gymnastics, the art of teaching gymnastics, anthropometry, emergencies and bandages. Dr. Stuart is especially fitted for her work in Physical Training. Besides her gymnastic training, she received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from the University of Michigan. During her professional study, she served as assistant in the Women's Gymnasium at Michigan, and later was appointed head of the department.

Reseeding Oregon's Burned Forests

The Forest Service plans the seeding of between 5000 and 6000 acres of burned-over lands at a cost of approximately \$20,000. About 700 acres, situated at the Bull Run watershed, the source of Portland's water supply will be reforested in this way. The largest amount of planting will be done in the Mt. Hebo district south of Tillamook, which was burned over in 1847 and never reforested. On most of this area Eastern hardwoods will be planted.

Apples For Jag Cure

The following from the N. Y. World is going the rounds and will be read with interest by all those weak mortals who are in search of a cure:

The W. C. T. U. of Cook County (Chicago) is going to fight drinking with apples. It was discovered that the agent which caused the fall of the human race may now regenerate it. Dr. Samuel Bailey, of Mount Airy, Ia., has been experimenting on the antitoxin qualities of apples. He has cured hundreds of drinkers by feeding them apples when they wanted drink. The women are sending out thousands of leaflets which read: "The use of apples as an article of diet will very much diminish, decrease and ultimately abate the appetite for alcoholic stimulants."

"That it is a fact could be proved in many instances if a little care, caution and vigilance be taken to investigate conditions. As a rule the habitual user of alcoholic stimulants is rarely a consumer of apples. There seems to be a peculiar combination in apples that allays the irritation, or so-called appetite produced by the use of liquor."
