J. N. Mosier, J. K. McGregor and A. P. Batcham went to Portland yesterday to consult with J. P. O'Brien, General Manager of the O. R. & N. Co., in regard to the improvements to the streets, now under way.

Mrs. H. Pickering received a letter this week from her husband, who, a week ago, went back to his former home at Laramie, Wyo., in which he says that he found very cold weather, and the ground covered with snow. Quite a change from our delightful autumn weather.

Apple pickers and packers are living high this season and command as much consideration as the proverbial cook. "Uncle" Lee Evans has been scouting them from orchard to orchard this week in his auto. The boys enjoy it and it saves much time, which means money to the grower.

Early last summer, thru the efforts of Wm. Vogt and John Burggraf, Master Fish Warden, H. C. McAllister, promised the people of Mosier 25,000 trout fry with which to stock Mosier Creek. Recently Mr. Burggraf received a letter from the superintendent of the Bonneville Hatchery saying that the supply of Fry is limited this Fall and he can send only 5,000, which will arrive today on the 10:50 local. Mr. Burggraf will receive them and place them in Mosier Creek.

Don't forget that the price of admission to the Basket Social and Entertainment on the evening of Nov. 5th, is 25 cts for every adult and 10 cts for every child under 12 years of age. It is often customary to allow those taking part on the program to come in free, but as there will be so many of them and the object of giving the entertainment to raise money for a public benefit, it has been decided to give every body an opportunity to add his share toward pushing a good thing along.

**Improvements**  
The edict has gone forth from the powers that be, and Main and Washington streets will be opened up to the depot at once. If this is done at once it will enable Mosier to properly gravel the road and walk to the station before the muddy season sets in. Arrangements are also reported under way to have the space between Washington street on the west and Idaho street on the east reserved for a park, which the town will keep up.

Also, permission has been granted by the O. R. & N. Co. to erect a building at the depot between the main and side tracks to be used as an exhibit room for Mosier products, the same as other towns on the line have. This has proven an excellent method of advertising a town or section and is being adopted everywhere. Mosier is waking up to the necessity of action, and realizes that to get a thing is to go after it.

Later.—It now appears that the O. R. & N. Co. will not grant all the improvements asked for by the citizens of Mosier. Workmen began Wednesday morning on the work of grading the foot of Main Street to a width of 49 feet, where 60 feet was requested. And, according to report, Washington street will not be opened now nor provision made for parking the right of way unless immediate action is taken by our citizens. A delegation went to Portland yesterday to interview Mr. O'Brien in regard to all the improvements necessary to make a respectable looking town. Mosier is small, it is true, and, apparently, insignificant and of little commercial importance judging from its present appearance and the indifference with which the railroad officials regard our requests for improvements that will benefit them as well as ourselves. But Mosier is forging to the front as a commercial center and her claims for recognition should not be ignored.
