FOR JOINT REPRESENTATIVE

J. T. Harper, candidate for Joint Representative from Hood River and Wasco Counties, was born in Mercer County, Mo., 54 years ago, growing to manhood in Buchanan county, in the same state. His father being a poor man with a large family to support, and the subject of this sketch being the oldest of six boys, had to go out early in life to earn his own living, thereby having to leave school at a very early age, having never gone to school after he was fifteen years old. Consequently, his education is largely practical, learned through experience.

After having gained his majority he went to Kansas, settling in Leavenworth County, where he farmed and worked as a laborer for a number of years. He was elected constable 6 successive terms and served one term as justice of the peace in the same precinct. He moved from there to Oklahoma, settling in Lincoln County, where he engaged in farming and stock raising. He served one term as coroner of Lincoln county, Okla., and was nominated for the legislature by acclamation by his party in the same county, but not being eligible on account of not having been in the territory long enough withdrew from the ticket. His health failing after he had lived in Oklahoma eight years he came to Oregon, arriving in The Dalles twelve years ago, where he resided a little more than one year, moving from there to his present location at Tygh Valley, in the southern part of Wasco county, where he has since been engaged in the mercantile business and farming.

He is serving his second term as Justice of the Peace in Tygh precinct. He stands for just what his declaration implies, for Statement No. 1, direct primary by all the voters and for fewer laws and better enforcement. If elected he will labor during the term for those things and for the best interests of all the people.

Railroad Officials Here

General Supt. J. D. Stack and Asst. Supt. W. Bollens, of the O. R. & N. Co., were here on Tuesday last to consult with a committee of the Commercial Club regarding a number of improvements which the Club has asked for. Before the officials left they had "come thru" handsomely in promising all that was asked for, with exception of the opening of Washington Street, which the officials said would interfere with their freight traffic. However, while the opening of this street was very much desired by the Club, it is only a question of the growth of the town westward when the street will be opened up to the depot.

The work of straightening and grading Main street over the right of way is now progressing and the street will be full sixty feet wide, instead of forty, as at first ordered. A sidewalk from the post office to the depot will also be built. A street will be opened up and graded from Main to Washington streets, running west along the line to A. Stewart's and S. E. Francisco's property.

The railroad officials have also given us the privilege of erecting an exhibit booth at the depot and have reserved the space between the town and railroad tracks, from Washington street on the west to Idaho street on the east, for a park.

The members of the Commercial Club who have been most active in securing these concessions from the O. R. & N. Co. deserve much credit for their perseverance in the matter and they should have the loyal support of every person in Mosier district. They are not working for personal gain but that the entire district might be benefited. Much yet remains to be accomplished, but we are progressing finely and by all standing together as a unit we can make of this section what we will and have what we want.

The committee for the big basket social and entertainment to-morrow night has decided that there will be no admission fee charged ladies bringing baskets, nor for children taking part in the program, nor for any child under 13 years of age. This action is taken because many of the children will take part on the program and the ladies will go to more or less expense in preparing baskets.
