Much Doing in Mosier

Much work will be done this winter in different localities in the way of clearing land and getting ready for Spring planting. On Monday last, Mr. Patterson, of the Homestead Orchard Co., with headquarters in the Henry Building, Portland, brought about 30 laborers who will clear the company's land on Rock Creek.

Also, D. D. Hail has taken a contract to clear 20 acres of land of the Fairview Orchard tract and ten acres of the Robinson land. He has engaged his men and will shortly have them at work.

Arrangements are being made by other companies and individuals to have many acres cleared this winter, so that by next Spring the acreage of land set to fruit trees will be considerably increased.
