OUR PORTLAND LETTER  
Portland, Ore. Nov. 22, (Special)  
—Men of national prominence will speak at the convention of the Oregon Development League to be held at Salem, Nov. 28, 29 and 30. Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific Railway, is one of the leading speakers and he will tell of the exploitation work the Northern Pacific is doing in Oregon's behalf and will suggest methods whereby the fullest possible benefit can be secured to this state.

Advertising and publicity men who stand in the front rank in their work in America are on the program and the brightest stars in community promotion on the Coast are scheduled for addresses. Frank E. Morrison, secretary of Success Magazine and one of the foremost magazine men in the United States is coming all the way from New York, to speak to the Oregon Leaguers.

There are many other speakers whose ideas will prove of great value. To hear them all will well be worth a trip to Salem from the most remote part of the state and all who can possibly arrange their affairs to attend the convention should do so. Splendid hospitality is offered by the Salem Board of Trade. This includes auto trips about the Capital City and the nearby country, visits to the state institutions and a big banquet on the night of the last day, Wednesday, Nov. 30.

Oregon apples have accomplished a signal victory by capturing the sweepstakes prize at the recent National Apple Show at Spokane. A carload of Hood River Spitzenbergs, exhibited by C. H. Sproat, took the \$1,000 award and gold medal banner over apples exhibited by practically every fruit growing section of the Northwest. This is the second year that Oregon apples have won first honors at Spokane last year Rogue River taking the sweepstakes. Apples from the Rogue River district also took first prize at the Canadian National Apple Show recently held at Vancouver, B. C.

W. O. Minor, of Heppner, is one of the state's most useful citizens. He has bred a famous herd of Shorthorn cattle that are the delight of livestock experts. Mr. Minor has sent seven head of his cattle to the International Livestock Exhibition at Chicago, where they will be exhibited and later sold. This is the only exhibit Oregon will make in what is claimed to be the greatest livestock show in the world. What Oregon needs is more Minors rather than more professionals men.

The Oregon Highway Association has been formed by good roads advocates for the purpose of building a main thoroughfare from north to south across the state, becoming part of the main highway along the Coast from Canada to Mexico. Monday, December 12, has been fixed as the date of the state good roads convention, when all interested in the work will meet in Portland to formulate good roads bills to present to the next Legislature.

With the completion of the Panama Canal, Secretary Williamson of the State Board of Horticulture, will come the opening of much wider markets for Oregon apples. He thinks the people of Europe can be supplied direct from Portland and that the demand there for this highly prized fruit will be strong.

The Church Rally  
As previously announced in these columns the Christian Church people of Mosier and vicinity conducted a rally at their church beginning on Monday evening and closing on Tuesday evening of this week.

The weather was quite stormy most of the time, yet there was a very good local attendance, many members from other churches and others not church members attended some of the sessions. All seemed pleased with the speakers and with the Rally generally.

The ladies of the congregation prepared a bounteous dinner and supper in the basement of the Church on Tuesday and all were invited to partake of the refreshments. The result was a splendid social time which every one seemed to enjoy to the full. It was especially fortunate that they did so owing to the heavy rains outside which made it almost impossible to get about.

C. F. Swander, of Portland, secretary of the Oregon Christian Missionary Society, conducted the State Mission sessions, speaking on each day of the Rally. He reported the outlook as very encouraging. Two evangelists are reported in the state. The society supports in part nearly a dozen missionary pastors in Oregon. The membership of the Christian Churches in Oregon is some sixteen thousand. The churches are increasing in membership and efficiency and liberality. Their national convention will be held in Portland next year. The attendance will be several thousand.

Mrs. Esson, of Forest Grove, represented the Sunday School work. She spoke twice. Her talks were interesting and instructive. She is a thorough Sunday School worker and has held the secretaryship for the Sunday School work in Oregon for several years. Sunday School work is being made very prominent in all the churches. The most modern, up-to-date methods of work are being generally adopted.

The achievement attained by the Oregon growers is the cause of general rejoicing in the state, as the records of the last two years show that Oregon is the banner apple-raising state in the United States.

"Oregon has cause to be proud of the honors won at the National Apple Show," says D. O. Lively, manager of the Union Stock Yards, who was among the visitors at Spokane from Portland.

"Our carload exhibits were easy winners. The success of our exhibitors means a great factor in building up the fruit growing industry of this state. By this means, large Eastern capital will no doubt be attracted to Oregon."

C. C. Chapman, manager of the Publicity Department of the Portland Commercial Club, was enthusiastic over the showing made by the Oregon growers at Spokane.

"This state has demonstrated beyond a doubt that it is the premier apple-growing country of the world," said Mr. Chapman. "This is the best kind of advertising we can get. The fruit industry here will be given an impetus that can scarcely be realized. Demand for apple lands in Oregon will be greater than ever. Every citizen of Oregon has a right to be proud of the achievements our growers have made. —Oregonian.

The rally was attended by delegates from Dufur, Heppner and Hood River. Every one, so far as we have been able to learn voted the rally a success in every way. The delegates praised the Mosierites for their hospitality and the Mosier people were delighted to have their brethren from away with them. The rally was a success.
