The Dalles Objects

It looks as if the census bureau worked a "cold deck" in on The Dalles in regard to its population. A dispatch from Washington, D. C., last week to The Chronicle said: "Population The Dalles, 4830, compared to 3542 in 1900." The civic pride of The Dalles people is hurt, and with apparent reason; for even an outsider can readily figure a larger increase than is given them by the bureau. The Chronicle says: "This news will be received by the people of this city with much disappointment and indignation, for while a gain of 1388 is shown for the last ten years, The Dalles has more than 5000 people within its limits."

The increase in the school census within the last 12 months alone was 250, or an addition of about 1500 people. The increase, as shown by the school census for only one year is greater than the increase within 10 whole years, as given by the government statistics.

Any person well versed in local affairs knows for an absolute fact that 4830, as the local population, is absurd. The school population here, as compiled a few weeks ago, is 1552. The Oregonian recently multiplied the Portland school census by 5.4 and the total was 209,320, as compared to the official government census for Portland, 207, 214. This rule, which worked so well in Portland's case, when applied to The Dalles, shows a population of 8380. Even the low ratio of 4 would show The Dalles to have 6208.

It may be stretching the proposition some to claim 8380 people for this city. However, 6500 is a most conservative estimate of the actual number of people residing within the city limits, and any man who understands local conditions would bet his last shirt against the hole in a doughnut that he could actually prove the same to be true, if he were given the job of enumerating local citizens.
