Fire at the State Capitol of Missouri entirely destroyed that building last Saturday, causing a loss of \$1,000,000, including many valuable documents. The penitentiary fire company was called out and the convicts did heroic work. Governor Hadley will pardon a number of the convicts who risked their lives while fighting the fire.

W. H. Kerslake was down on Wednesday getting supplies for the road-working camp on Mosier creek. He said that already 200 days' work had been subscribed on the road and that the work was progressing finely. He said that this road would connect at least fifty families directly with Mosier, many of whom now trade at The Dalles.

### Wreck at Tunnel No. 2

Seven cars loaded with flour wheat and barley, piled up in a heap just beyond the tunnel a mile east of Mosier, on Tuesday forenoon, caused by a broken flange. Wrecking crews were at once called to the scene and worked like beavers to clear the track. The two east bound passenger trains due at 10:40 and 12 o'clock were delayed two and three hours.

Supt. Bollens and Assistant Superintendents W. R. Ladd and Wm. Jaekle hurried up from Portland on a special and directed the work of the crews and investigated the cause of the wreck. In order to prove to the public that not only this particular accident, but the majority of accidents occurring occasionally, are unavoidable, Supt. Bollens asked for a committee of Mosier citizens to accompany him to the wreck and investigate with him. We give below the report which was made, which report will be made public thru the various papers along the line. The report relieves the train crew from blame in the matter. A peculiar feature of the case is that while the wheel which caused the wreck was defective, the flaw was one that would escape the most minute inspection. It was simply unavoidable.

Supt. Bollens remarked to the committee of citizens that his company was always willing to give the public correct information in regard to such matters, that it may see for itself that the company is not to blame for delays in passenger traffic.

The report follows:

On Line, February 7, 1911.

Report of Board of Inquiry, derailment of freight train No. 23, engine No. 193, between Mile Post 74 & 75, between Mosier and Rowena, 10: a. m., Tuesday, February 7th.

Train No. 23, Engine No. 193, consisting of 22 leads, 1,074 tons, Conductor Haynes, Engineer Graham derailed 7 cars on six degree curve, damaging equipment to the extent of \$1,900, contents \$500.00 and track \$50.00.

We find the derailment was caused by the breaking of 23 inches of flange from wheel on S. P. car No. 21680, loaded with flour. Accident happened within block signal limits, block signals not affected.

### Big Lumber Company for Mosier

A deal was consummated last week, thru McGregor & Co., whereby the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co., of Walla Walla, Wash., becomes possessed of a strip of land, running 200 feet on First Avenue, cornering on Washington Street. The company has also leased from the O. W. R. & N. Co. a parcel of land along the right of way opposite on which they will establish a large lumber yard. Arrangements have been made with Mr. Guy Wilson to build at once a large warehouse on the tract leased from J. N. Mosier. It is the purpose of the company to carry everything in the line of building material, including lime, cement, brick, etc., excepting hardware. They will also handle coal and wood, if the trade demands it.

Messrs. J. M. Crawford, President and General Manager of the Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co., and Jno. M. Davis, the company's Auditor, were in Mosier last week and took an option on the property belonging to Mr. Mosier, and later Mr. Davis returned and closed the deal.

The Tum-A-Lum Lumber Co. has lumber interests in Oregon and Washington, operating many lumber yards in both states. The prospects of doing business in Mosier evidently looked good to these gentlemen, and Mosier welcomes them here.

### Horticulturalists Meet

At a meeting of the Horticultural Society, held last Saturday at Lamb's Hall, several topics of interest and importance were discussed, among them being the Stock Law, violations of which have caused much annoyance and damage to horticulturalists in Mosier District.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLVED that we earnestly protest against any violation of the Stock Law in this precinct.

RESOLVED that we will support the District Attorney or other authorities in taking any legal steps to punish such violations.

RESOLVED that a committee of five be appointed to report any such violations and assist in the prosecution of same, said committee to consist of D. P. Harvey, Road Supervisor of District No. 10, C. J. Fredrickson, Road Supervisor of District No. 9, George Chamberlain, C. J. Littlepage and Gerald Wyss.
