## OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Ore. Feb 14, (Special)  
The Hill and Harriman lines will subscribe \$1,000 each to the 1911 Rose Festival. President John F. Stevens of the North Bank announced the Hill subscription this week and Harriman officials say the \$1,000 formerly given will be forthcoming this season as usual. Both railroad systems are making great efforts to handle an unusually heavy traffic during June because of the wide advertising that will be given the Festival and the large number of tourists attracted this way as a result.

Portland is joining with other cities of the Coast in helping to relieve the famine situation in China. Large quantities of food stuffs will be sent from this city to the sufferers, transportation companies having agreed to carry the supplies without charge.

Central Oregon will hear the locomotive whistle for the first time this summer. Operation of the Oregon Trunk will probably be commenced to Madras early in March and somewhat later the Deschutes Railroad will run trains to Redmond. These new lines will mark the beginning of a new era of settlement for the whole region east of the Cascade Mountains.

The formation of a syndicate to clear logged-off lands of Southwest Washington and place them on the market is a step that might be followed with profit on this side of the Columbia River. These lands, once cleared, are among the most valuable for diversified farming, fruit growing and dairying. To put them to use is to make a great addition to the wealth of the state.

A city of 2,000,000 people at Portland is included in the plan of Municipal Architect E. H. Bennett, who is mapping out a greater city. His project calls for the segregation of the various activities into districts and groups and the beautification of the whole municipality. Parks, boulevards and better buildings are prominent features of the plan.

## Likfresh Fruit Exhibited

Last Saturday Mr. Geo. K. Rogers, representing the Likfresh Evaporator Co., came up from Portland at the invitation of some of our citizens and gave a most interesting lecture on fruit and vegetable evaporation at a fruit growers' meeting Saturday afternoon. We wish that every fruit grower around Mosier could have attended and heard that lecture. Mr. Rogers showed plainly the great profit that would result to this community in the care of its waste products and also in the development of large areas of ground which cannot now be worked profitably. He brought with him a large variety of samples which had been dried by the Likfresh system, ranging from dried fish to the most delicate vegetables and berries. He also cooked a number of these products at the hotel, such as string beans, blackberries, logan berries, cauliflower, apples, rhubarb, etc., and these were served to about twenty of the fruit growers. Every man who tasted the products was loud in his praise and all were agreed that had they not known the products were dried they could not have told it by looks, taste or smell from the fresh fruits and vegetables.

That one of these plants will be erected in our community at a very early date is a foregone conclusion. The quicker we get it in for the first small fruits and vegetables this Spring the better. Towns all over the Willamette valley and at some points across the river in Washington are already erecting these plants and we should not be behind in the proposition.

All our seconds and culls in apples can by this process be taken care of and then shipped into the interior of Alaska next season when the river is open, where they will doubtless command prices even greater than we can get for our Class A product in the present market. Not only will there be a tremendous value to this community in taking care of what is now almost, if not entirely, lost, but there is a greater loss to this community in taking care of what is not now produced at all, being entirely undeveloped, for lack of ability to care for the products after they have been grown.

Further, we send out every year large sums of money for canned peas, tomatoes, string beans, corn and other products which would be saved to this community if we had one of these machines. But on top of the great economic value this machine would be to this community, it would be worth all it would cost, to be able to place on the tables of every family in this vicinity all through the winter, in fact every day in the year, every variety of fruits and vegetables which are now produced here. We earnestly hope that our citizens will immediately take hold of this proposition and proceed to the erection of a plant for the care of fruits and vegetables by this system.
